



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## **Executive Summary**

In the era of radical globalization, the importance of Female Education cannot be underestimated. The learned master Swami Vivekananda was a staunch supporter of promoting Female Education. He advocated the need to open educational institutions in every nook and corner of the country, because, he believed that:

"If the conditions of women are improved, then their children will, by their noble actions, glorify the name of the country". —Swami Vivekananda Considering the importance of female education, the role of an institution imparting education to girls becomes all the more pertinent. Realizing the prominence of female education, A. S. College for Women, Khanna came into being in the year 1973.

A.S.College for Women, Khanna affiliated to Panjab University, Chandigarh is marching ahead under dynamic and progressive guidance of A.S. High School Khanna Trust and Management Society, Khanna which consists of highly cultured, dedicated and enlightened persons. They are always supportive and enthusiastic to promote the cause of education. Sh.Sh.1008 Swami Narotam Puri Ji Maharaj, Patron of the institution had been an eminent source of inspiration. It is creditable to know that the formal inauguration of the College was performed by Honorable Late S. Giani Zail Singh, the Chief Minister of Punjab at that time. Since that historic moment, the prestigious A.S. College for Women, Khanna, recognized as a premier



center for Female Education has been making its mark in the academic map of the country. Under the dynamic guidance of the worthy management of the college led by the office bearers C.A. Sh. Rakesh Goyal (President), Sh. Raj Kumar Sahnewalia (Vice-President), Sh. Vijay Sharma (General Secretary) and Sh. Vikas Mehta (Secretary), a squad of hardworking staff led by a Principal with constructive and futuristic vision is the constructive force that adds feather in the

cap. All the members of the teaching and the non-teaching staff work as a team, for the betterment of the institution as well as for the enhancement of the college ideals. The outcome of this joint endeavor is reflected in the excellent results shown by the 6 students in academics, sports, co-curricular and cultural activities.

From the tiny sapling in the year 1973 with a small number of 473, the college has now grown up into a huge tree of knowledge having 1447 students and about 80 staff members. The college strives to fulfill its mission to provide educational opportunities to all the aspiring young girls to excel in life by developing academic excellence, fostering values, creating civic responsibility and buildingglobal competency in a dynamic environment. Ever since the

inception of the college, it has risen from strength to strength and made its mark in a range of fields-academic, cultural and sports. The institution has been marching forward keeping in focus the goal oriented and value added facilities for its stakeholders. The college thrives on a unique blend of retaining traditional values and incorporating technological advancement. It was founded with the avowed aim of spreading the benefits of education to women synchronizing tradition with modernity, is reflected in each and every sphere of the institution. The performance appraisal of the institution is summarized below:-

## I. Curricular Aspects

A.S. College for Women upholds the motto of <u>'Satyam Shivam Sundram'</u> to serve as an inspiration to the students.Our aim is to impart physical, mental and spiritual training to our students so that they may acquire enough strength to cope with the challenges of life.

The college is a well established institution, situated in semi-urban area, imparting education in 04 Undergraduate Courses-B.A.,B.Com.B.C.A., B.Sc.,(FashionDesigning), 05 Post graduate Courses-

M.A.Hindi,M.A.Economics,M.Sc. Mathematics, M.A. Sociology, PGDCA and two Add On Courses, one Communicative English and another Computer Based Accounting. In the beginning, the college was providing a choice of only 5 elective subjects, but the number of subjects has now swelled up to 18. The college offers a wide range of courses and flexibility to



its students regarding the choice of subjects and courses. Besides 2 compulsory subjects(English and Punjabi), the students have the option to select three elective subjects out of 18 subjects which are Elective Punjabi, Hindi, English, Sanskrit, History, Political Science, Economics, Public Administration, Sociology, Home Science, Music (Instrumental), Maths, Fine Arts, Computer Science, Physical Education, Functional English, Fashion Designing and Classical dance. It is compulsory for the students to study Environment Education as a non credit qualifying course at the under graduate level. Besides this, at present the college is running various Crash Courses namely:

- Crash Course in Spoken English
- Crash Course in Computer Application
- Crash Courses in Internet and Basic Computers
- Crash Course in English to Hindi Translation
- Crash Course in Fine Arts
- Crash Course in Fashion Designing
- Crash Course in Personality Development

This provides sufficient academic flexibility that caters to the academic needs of the youth of the area so as to enable skill development, academic mobility, progression to higher studies and improve potential for employability that could be provided under the affiliating system of Panjab University, Chandigarh and the resources of the institution.Co-curricular and cultural activities are meticulously planned to enhance the effectiveness of

formal curriculum, impart additional skill, inculcate moral and civil values and sensitize the youth towards social and environmental issues. The quality of Faculty is the anchor-sheet of any academic institution. The college is fortunate enough to have an exciting roster of teachers who are dynamic, updated, inspirational, innovative, result-oriented and tremendously accessible. With a lot of Ph.Ds, M.Phils and UGC/NET clear, the college faculty has a fair mix of teachers and researchers.

The college has made giant strides in academic, curricular, co-curricular and cultural activities. The college has been showing excellent results in University Exams since its very inception in 1973. In 2013-2014 Ms. Alisha of B.A I has brought laurels to the institution by bagging covetous First Position in the University Examination held by Panjab University, Besides this, the institution has a glorious past record of Chandigarh. bagging 04 First positions, 02 Second, 03 Third, 04 Fifth,02 Sixth, 02 Ninth and 01 Seventh, Eighth, Tenth and Fourteenth Positions respectively in Panjab University Examinations during the post accreditation period. The College had a whopping scorecard in the academic arena during the last four academic sessions. Under the expert guidance of the Management and the Principal and co-ordinated efforts of the teachers, the excellent annual results of the last sessionin University Examinations, kept aloft the glorious tradition as the general pass percentage of M.A. (Hindi) M.A. (Eco), M.A. (Soc), M.Sc. (Maths), B.Com III, B.C.A. III, B.Com. III Hons. B.C.A III Hons. and B.AIII Hons.was 100%;that of B.AII and B.A III was more than 95% and pass percentage of the college was much higher than University pass percentage. As many as 2170 students of the college made their alma-mater proud by getting first divisions and out of this, 549 students of the college scored 70% and 08 students got above 80% marks in university examination in last four sessions. These excellent results show that though a large section of our student population comes from rural background, still their academic performance is quite exemplary.

Since the college is affiliated to Panjab University, Chandigarh, it follows the syllabus prescribed by the affiliating university. There is limitation on the part of the college to bring immediate innovative changes in the syllabus. However, a number of faculty members of the institution are a part of the Board of studies, faculties and Academic council of the affiliating university. They make valuable contribution in designing the curriculum. They also give their hand in covering the feedback from the different stakeholders.

## II. Teaching-Learning and Evaluation

The college prospectus which contains all the information about the courses of study available, rules and regulations governing admission and also fee structure, works as major tool for ensuring publicity and transparency in admission process. Admission process is a well planned mechanism, which abides by the norms and regulations of the affiliating/regulatory/governing agencies which includes state and central govt. The policy of 'First come First served' is channelized to make sure the working of the principle of equality. It can be well seen in the diversity of geographical areas, socio-economic culture

and educational backgrounds to which the students belong. The college holds remedial classes for the weak students and also offers special guidance to the brilliant students to better their academic record. All pedagogical teaching methods are followed in addition to the regular classroom teaching. The students opting for the competitive examinations get benefited from the teachers, guiding them and mentoring them.

Academic session starts with the Hawan Yajana to invoke the blessings of the Almighty every year. As soon as the classes commence, a general Assembly (which is the regular feature of the college) of the student is organized. The aim of holding the assembly is to acquaint the fresh students with various cultural and academic activities to be undertaken during the session in which they can participate, Rules and regulations regarding holding of unit tests, oral tests, house examination and evaluation methods, functioning of library, N.S.S. Units, N.C.C Unit, Youth Service Club, Red Cross Society and 20 subject societies and standard of conduct and behavior of them during the college hours.

Students at the entrancelevel i.e. B.A.I, B.Com I and B.C.A I are allowed the change of subject/change of faculty within a limited time frame. Commerce and B.C.A. Students can shift to Arts stream. Arts students, if eligible can change over to Commerce and B.C.A. The session comprises well-defined three terms, July to September (1st Term), October to December (2ndTerm) and January to March (3<sup>rd</sup> Term). The teachers normally divide their syllabus to be taught into three parts, up to 75% of the syllabus covered till December. Third term is devoted to cover remaining 25% of the syllabus and revision. For semester classes, syllabus is divided into two terms, July to September (1<sup>st</sup> Term) and October to December (2<sup>nd</sup> Term). Facilities of remedial classes for educationally disadvantaged students as well as students belonging to weaker sections of the society are available.

In addition to the mandatory class tests (compulsory for students to become eligible to appear in the final exams) weekly/monthly tests are held in the classes as a matter of routine. It helps a teacher to evaluate his/her students on regular basis. The students too come to know of their own progress. Staff meetings are held regularly in our college in which the performance of the students is discussed. It also helps the Principal to assess and monitor the working of the teachers and the minutes of all the staff meetings are recorded. The students are required to attend 75% of lectures delivered as per the University rules. At the end of each term, students are informed about the percentage of attendance. If any student falls short of the required percentage, her parents are informed about the shortage at the end of each term. Students are also informed about the shortage of lectures at the end of every month and they are asked to put their signatures in the register after noting down their shortage.

The performance of teachers is assessed through annual confidential reports (A.C.R). In such reports, the results of the classes taught by a teacher

are compared with the university results. In addition to this, a teacher's contribution in running the college is also assessed. The college is proudly maintaining excellent standards of academics and discipline. It is due to the harmonious relationship between the teachers and the taught. The teachers are ever ready to give free coaching to the students at all hours.

The Academic schedule is a well planned mix bag of co-curricular and cultural activities. Special emphasis is placed on making teaching-learning student centric. Methods like assignments, audio-visual aids, question answer sessions, class tests, snap tests, case studies, net surfing and workshops are incorporated in teaching-learning process, as these all are based on the mass participation of the students. Hammering is done to inculcate a critical, intellectual and creative temperament in the disciples. Internal assessment cannot be under estimated in the evaluation process. Attendance at lectures, performance of the students in the house exams, class tests are taken into consideration for the evaluation process. Seminars, presentations and projects are also the contributing factors.

#### III. Research, Extension and Collaboration

Research and development of higher level research has been one of our major focuses in recent years. The college encourages its staff to take up research activities and engage themselves in interdisciplinary and interdepartmental research. Although the college does not have any recognized research centre of the affiliating university but as per the recommendations of NAAC peer team of SSR (Cycle I), a Research Promotion Cell has been constituted to monitor and address the issues of research. The cell facilitates access to research oriented activities like presentation of research papers and get them published in research journals of national and international repute. During last four years, as many as 05 faculty members have obtained the coveted Ph.D. degree, 03 members have registered for doctoral programme and 02 have registered for M.Phil from reputed universities of Punjab. Faculty members have also excelled in publication work. During last four years and till date, 04 Books and 08 Chapters in Books have got published by the faculty. 56 Research papers/Articles/Poems have been published in reputed International and National Journals with ISBN No. and in newspapers. Teachers actively participate in seminars, conferences, workshops, orientation programmes and refresher courses. 37 research papers have been presented at various seminars and conferences and recently as the institution has got sanctioned the grant from UGC, New Delhi for setting up Swami Vivekanand Study Centre and Dr. Ambedkar Study Centre and also for setting up smart class rooms, a well-defined policy has been prepared for augmenting infrastructure to facilitate effective teaching-learning process.

The Research Promotion Cell of the college also acts as facilitator for the faculty providing the details of funding agencies in different research areas. As a result of this, in 2013, Post Graduate Department of Mathematics took initiative to apply and get grant of Rs. 1,06,000/- from Department of Science and Technology, New Delhi and Panjab University, Chandigarh to organize 3 Days' National Conference on the topic 'Recent Trends in Algebra and

Analysis' in which 45 research papers of high quality from scholarly academicians of reputed institutions were presented. Research ambience in the campus is achieved by the visits of a number of dignitaries and eminent personalities from the fields of Politics, Education from various reputed universities and organizations. Dr. Meenu Sharma, Principal of the college was honoured "Rashtriya Gaurav Award" by India International Friendship Society. She was also awarded major Research Project by UGC, New Delhi with grant of Rs. 5,62,000/- in March, 2007.

Regarding Extension services; the college imbibes civic responsibility in the young minds through extension programmes and value-based courses so that they come out as socially responsible and groomed up women. The college offers many programmes and students are encouraged to take up any one of these activities- National service Scheme (NSS), National Cadet Corps (NCC), Red Cross Society & Red Ribbon Club and Central Association.

Van Mahotsav/Environment Awareness campaign is conducted every year, need-based extension activities are conducted through different associations/committees and NSS. Considering the importance of computer knowledge in this era of computerization, we provide easy and affordable access to computer education to our staff. Meditation lectures and health related lectures like yoga activities are also organized and maximum students join these events.

Keeping in view, the relevance of the research in the modern era, the college has taken the initiative of establishing the research promotion cell. This cell aims at broadening the research based vision in the students. The issue of environment preservation has been a crash project in the past four sessions. Tree plantation has been executed around the college campus, many other educational institutions and religious places. Different clubs and committees of the institution have been organizing extensive awareness programmes like environment pollution, drug abuse, AIDS, Swine Flu, female foeticide, health and fitness etc. The collusion with Government and NGOs such as Lions Club, Red Cross, Local Civil Hospital, Local Administration, Municipal Committees, and Village Panchayats etc. has been a major concern of the institution. During the ongoing session 2014-15, 02 NSS units of the college consisting of 200 NSS volunteers have worked hard with single hearted approach to apprehend the newly inserted nation-wide approach 'Swachh Bharat and Swasth Bharat' on 02.10.2014 vide Letter No. D.O.No. F.1-9/2014(CM) received from University Grants Commission 29.09.2014. All sorts of activities including Tree Plantation, waste management, plastic free environment, rain-water harvesting, smoke and drug-free campus have been inculcated.

## IV. Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The institution, being a multi faculty post graduate institution is housed in a magnificent triple storey building. Spread over an area of 7664 sq. mts., the

college boasts of modern and well equipped infrastructure for comfort, convenience and academic pursuits. The building is well maintained with 51 rooms with proper lighting arrangement and ventilation including 23 class rooms, 16 hostel rooms,03 Computer Science Labs., 2 Fashion Designing labs, 2 Home Science labs, Fine Arts lab, Language lab, Music and Dance room and a big auditorium with seating capacity of 800 students equipped with LCD Projector, hi-tech Conference hall with seating capacity of 150 persons equipped with Interactive Board and Interactive LCD Projector, Mini Hall, airconditioned Staff room, Visitor's room, 2 General offices and an Accounts office. The institution has very spacious and well maintained canteen, common room for students, Reading room, TV and Video room and Scooter stand for staff and students. The college makes special efforts to integrate technology with teaching learning process. Well equipped three Computer labs with 48 computers, 4 laptops and Internet facility with speed upto 572 Kbps, LCD and Over Head Projectors (OHPs) are available to facilitate computer-aided teaching and enrich the teaching learning experience.

The college has air-conditioned, fully furnished and well equipped library with more than 25990 books, 15 newspapers, 75journals/periodicals along with internet facility for searching 6000 free e-journals through INFLIBNET facility to facilitate research work by staff and students. The college also provides Book Bank facility. During the last four years, various faculty members and as many as 1781 students of the college got benefitted from the Library's Reader's Club facility and Book Bank facility specially meant for helping the needy and meritorious students.

College playground includes 200 metre track, stadium, fully furnished Gymnasium Hall and equipments for Table Tennis, weight lifting, Badminton, wrestling, Boxing, Chess, Judo, Tai Kamando, Yoga, Kho-Kho, Kabaddi, Shot Put, Discuss Throw, Long Jump, Javelin Throw and High Jump.

The College has a double-storey Hostel located in the College premises itself, with accommodation having all modern facilities. A 45-seater Bus facility is available for staff and students. To ensure uninterrupted power supply, the institution has three generators with the capacity of 125 KVA, 63 KVA and 25 KVA, as a backup for hostel and the college along with 3 Inverters of 3 KVA, 2 KVA and 1000Watts. There are 05 Submersible Pumps to cater to the needs of the institution in the college campus as well as Sports ground. 26 CCTV Cameras have been installed at prime locations in the campus and hostel to ensure security to staff and students for 24X7 hours.

The college infrastructure is put to optimum use by organizing departmental functions, NSS Camps during autumn break and even on gazetted holidays. College auditorium is used by Khatri Sabha to organize functions, Government agencies for census and conduct of MLA, MC elections, preparation of Ration Cards, Senior Citizens Association, Bharti Vikas Parishad for holding functions and also by Punjab Police for holding their seminars. College ground is used for residents of the town for morning and evening walks and playing games.

## V. Student Support and Progression

Transparent system in publishing the Prospectus, Annual Report and College Magazine 'Avastha' annually which are comprehensive and detailed documents alongwith College Website, is a prominent feature of the institution. The diverse programmes in academics and co-academics as well as sports, cultural and social activities organized by various clubs and societies, NCC and NSS units of the college are well synchronized and reinforced with an effective support system to produce enlightened and self-reliant women as visualized in the vision and mission of the college.

Financial help like fee concession admissible under government rules, scholarships like National Loan Scholarship, Smt. Amar Joshi Stipend, scholarships and stipends to SC/ST, BCs and lower income group students are granted liberally out of Govt. fund, management fund and student aid fund. In last four years and till date, as many as 2626 students have been facilitated to get benefit of the scholarships and financial aid amounting to Rs. 11103885/-.

The institution is providing managerial skills to students through their active participation in various aspects of administration. They all are sensitized to values of responsibility, initiative and decision making. Central Association representing the voice of students acts as a link between the Principal and students. Students are representatives of classes, various clubs and subject societies. In Editorial Board of college magazine 'Avastha', each section has one student editor who assists in editing of that section.

Regarding student progression, the institution is offering post graduation in four subjects namely Hindi, Economics, Sociology and Mathematics and also PG Diploma in Computer Applications alongwith 02 Add-on-Courses and various Crash Courses which facilitate progression of students from one level of education to the next higher level and towards gainful employment.

The college has made giant strides in co-curricular and cultural gamut by achieving outstanding positions at Inter-Zonal and Zonal Youth and Heritage Festivals, State-Level and Inter-College competitions. In last four years, in Inter- Zonal Youth and Heritage Festival, students of our college achieved 01 First position and 02 Third positions, while in Zonal Youth and Heritage Festival students bagged 20 First positions (Individual and Group), 18 Second positions and 19 Third positions over the last 4 years. The institution is going to organize Youth Festival in session 2017-18. In State level/Inter college competitions, students bagged 06 First positions, 05 Second positions, 05 Third positions, 01 Sixth position and 1st Runner-up (Miss World Punjaban Contest).

In Sports also, our sports girls brought laurels to the college. During last four years and till date, our college teams of Chess, Table Tennis, Judo, Badminton, Wrestling, Football, Boxing, Athletics and weight-lifting participated in Inter College, Inter University, State and National level competitions and won Gold Medals: 04, Silver Medals: 06, Bronze Medals: 13, Second Position: 01, Third Positions: 03, Fourth Positions: 07, Fifth Positions: 05, Sixth Position: 01 and Seventh Position: 01. Five sports students

were selected for Inter-University Camps and 01 student was selected for North Zone All India Inter- University Competition at Rudrapur (Nainital).

In last four sessions, two NSS Units of the college organized 7 Day's Day Camps and Day-Night Camps. Community development activities, health awareness lectures and free eye and dental checkup camps, sanitation drives have been undertaken during these camps.

During last four years, NCC cadets attended various Pre-RD Camps and Annual Training Camps at various places of Punjab and won Gold Medals: 07, Silver Medals: 16, Bronze Medals: 01, First Positions: 01, Second Positions: 03, Third Positions: 01. Two NCC cadets were awarded Sahara Scholarships of Rs. 12,000/- each. A number of NCC Cadets were selected for Firing Camps at NCC Academy, Ropar.

Students are provided with the services of Grievance Redressal cell and Carrer Guidance and Counseling Cell. The college magazine 'Avastha' gives platform to the students to express their views and hence develop their thoughts and the writing skills.

## VI Governance, Leadership and Management:

The institution aims at providing value-based and job-oriented education to the students to make them responsible citizens and economically independent, The college alongwith other 06 sister institutions is working in this direction under the dynamic and progressive guidance of A.S. High School Khanna Trust and Management Society, Khanna which constitutes highly cultured and enlightened persons. Our 20 member Management Committee scrutinizes the working of 07 educational institutions through their respective Governing Bodies consisting of 09 members, 02 special invitees and 02 staff representatives. Management encourages the participation of staff in the process of decision making as the institution believes in the principal of collective decision-making. The supportive management provides a host of welfare schemes for teaching and non-teaching staff.

The Principal coordinates between the management, local administration, government agencies and the University. In the beginning of the session, Principal alongwith Dean of Academics, Co-Academics, Dean of Sports, Alumni Association, College Advisory Committee, members of Time Table Committee and Examination Committee evolves strategies for academic growth of the institution. All the decisions are implemented through various administrative and academic committees and the departments. In compliance with NAAC regulations, Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has been functioning as a quality sustenance measure since 2005. It keeps a tap on ensuring the achievement of quality polices and plans. It evaluates and reports on the performance of various committees and departments. Suggestions and feedback collected from the students help in taking decisive steps to resolve the grievances. Various constructive steps like new washrooms, seminar hall, extended parking facility and Common room for girls have been an outcome of the valuable student feedback. Apart from this, the alumni association has also been actively involved in upgradation of the institution.

The institution has Student Grievance Redressal and Gender Sensitization Committee against Sexual Harassment which addresses the queries and grievances raised by the students and their parents and stakeholders and solves them effectively upto their satisfaction. Priority is given by the institution to the faculty empowerment programme for teaching and non-teaching staff which is achieved by facilitating the staff in attending national and international seminars, conferences, workshops and extension lectures. Upgradation of pay scales is done on the basis of performance appraisal reports of teaching and non-teaching staff. The major sources of institutional receipts are fee/funds from students, Grant from State Govt, from UGC, from M.P/M.L.A and donations. Deficit is managed through donations. The college also makes efforts to secure additional funds from various govt. agencies like DST New Delhi and local bodies. The accounts of the institution are regularly audited by the external qualified chartered Accountant. Bursar scrutinizes authentically the bills, vouchers and the cash book. Accountant General Punjab conducts the audit of Govt. grants.

In order to sensitize the students about the global environmental issues, the subject of environmental education is taught as a compulsory subject to all the UG students. The institution has been especially concerned to the valuable suggestions provided by the NAAC peer teem during the First NAAC Accreditation. - To encourage the students to adopt one project of Social Service.
- To organize frequent seminars and workshops to broaden the mental horizons of the teachers and the students.
- To inculcate Cosmopolitan outlook among the students.
- To provide every facility to the teachers and the taught to keep them aware of the latest developments in the field of Information Technology.
- To produce socially, economically, culturally, ethically and politically compatible citizens.

**Objectives of the Institution:** The following objectives are buttoned down by the institution to consummate its vision and missions:

• To serve the socially and financially debilitated sections of the society in Khanna and its surrounding to bring about a transfiguration in the women youth through education.

- To impel the students to realize their hidden talents to the best of their capacity.
- To animate the students towards burning contemporary issues and to handle them in a level-headed manner and work as team by holding seminars and organizing extension lectures.
- To inseminate a sense of empathy among them for the fellow humans,
- We convey Vision, Mission and objective of the Institution many influential ways including Monday Morning Assembly, Prospectus and 'Avastha Magazine', College Website (<a href="www.ascwkhanna.com">www.ascwkhanna.com</a>), Display Boards, College functions and Staff meetings.

# 1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example (s).

Division of the session is done by the college advisory committee comprising of faculty members and Principal of the college. Allocation of classes to the teachers and teaching work load is prepared by Heads of various departments and additional faculty is recruited before the classes are initiated. The Time table Committee of the College prepares the time table for different streams and they also divide different classes into sections according to the strength for a particular subject.

- Schedule of work is provided to each student and faculty members at start of academic session. The course is divided into two terms in the semester system i.e. (July-Sept., Oct.-Dec) and in annual system the course is divided in to three terms i.e. (July-Sept., Oct.-Dec., Jan. to March)
- The records of the class work, tests and attendances of the students are maintained by the staff members and are monitored by the heads of the Departments and the Principal from time to time.
- Members of the faculty contrive notes and study metrial to benefit the students with different abilities in order to facilitate their academic success, if needed.
- Acclimations of the classes are made if a teacher is on leave or 'on duty' (like attending meetings, accompanying the students to various competitions).
- Revision of the syllabus is a regular feature of the classroom teaching to produce desirable results.
- Assignments are given to the students, which are regularly monitored by the teachers.
- Library services, with a wide selection of reference books and journals/periodicals are provided to the students.
- The students have access to computers and internet facilities to add to their pedantic resources.
- House Examinations are conducted twice-I<sup>st</sup> term House Exams in September and 2<sup>nd</sup> Term House Exam in December for annual system classes and one house examination in the Mid of semester for semester system classes. In the session to provide complete revision and practice before the final university examinations. Special tests and Special Classes are conducted for the students who do not qualify university condition.

- The students are greeted to bring their feedback and healthy suggestions in order to make the teaching-learning process more smooth and effective
- For the overall evolvement of the students, alongwith formal curriculum, co-curricular and extra- curricular activities are planned and carried out throughout the year.
- The quality of the education imparted to student is monitored and ensured through Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). Regular feedback obtained from the stakeholders, with respect to the quality of the enrichment programmes are monitored and evaluated by the IQAC and necessary remedial measures are incorporated in the future. Further, the quality of education imparted is periodically evaluated by external agencies like the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC).

# 1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

University provides the support to teachers in following ways:

- The Affiliating University provides Academic Calendar, the entire syllabus, text books and reference books details, pattern of question papers to be set in the University examination, list of practical examination, guidelines for assessments, class tests to be conducted etc., which capacitate the teachers to formulate a schedule to be followed in the academic year
- The University cautions the institution well in time through members in various boards of studies or through correspondence, whenever there is any change in the curriculum design.
- The University endorses a wide range of elective subjects and equally good number of subject combinations to cater to the needs of students having varied intellectual interests and capabilities. The University makes provision of the Research Journal's Publication. The Faculty is geared up to contribute to the Research Journals with their intellectual and creative writing.

Uphold is also provided by the institution for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices in following ways:-

- The college makes special efforts to integrate technology with teaching learning process. Well equipped 3 Computer labs with 48 computers, 4 laptops and Internet facility with speed upto 572 Kbps, LCD and Over Head Projectors (OHPs) are available to facilitate computer-aided teaching and enrich the teaching learning experience.
- The institution, being a multi faculty post graduate institution is housed in a magnificent triple storey building. Spread over an area of 7664 sq. mts., the college boasts of modern and well equipped infrastructure for comfort, convenience and academic pursuits. The building is well maintained with 51 rooms with proper lighting arrangement and ventilation including 23 class rooms, 16 hostel rooms, 03 Computer Labs., 2 Fashion Designing labs, 2 Home Science labs, Fine Arts lab, Language lab, Music and Dance room and a big auditorium with seating capacity of 800 students equipped

with LCD Projector, hi-tech Conference hall with seating capacity of 150 persons equipped with Interactive Board and Interactive LCD Projector, Mini Hall, air-conditioned Staff room, Visitor's room, 2 General offices and an Accounts office. The institution has very spacious and well maintained canteen, common room for students, Reading room, TV and Video room and Scooter stand for staff and students.

- The college has air conditioned, fully furnished and well equipped library with reading room and Reference Section with more than 25990 books, on all subjects. It subscribes to 15 newspapers, 75 journals/periodicals along with internet facility for free e-journals for the benefits of the students and the staff members. In addition to this, the faculty has access to a wide range of e-learning resources by means of UGC-NLIST programme named Information and Library Network (INFLIBNET)
- Faculty members are given access to internet facility in computer Lab. The college management along with Head of the institution always encourages the teachers to attend seminars, conferences, workshops, refresher courses and orientation courses in other institutions including latest information about the teaching pedagogy, ICT trends, and Duty leave is provided to the staff for this purpose.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

The college offers a wide range of courses and flexibility to its students regarding the choice of subjects and courses. In the beginning, the college was providing a choice of only 5 elective subjects, but the number of subjects has now swelled up to 18. Besides 2 compulsory subjects (English and Punjabi), the students have the option to select three elective subjects out of 18 subjects which are Elective Punjabi, Hindi, English, Sanskrit, History, Political Science, Economics, Public Administration, Sociology, Home Science, Music (Instrumental), Maths, Fine Arts, Computer Science, Physical Education, Functional English, Fashion Designing and Classical dance.

During the Post accreditation period,in 2003-2004 MA. Hindi was introduced, in 2004-05 M.A. Economics was introduced. Classical Dance was introduced in 2012-2013 as an elective subject, in 2012-13 M.Sc Mathematics and M.A Sociology were introduced,in 2013-14, B.Sc F.D. and 02 Add-on Courses were introduced. At present the college is having total 04 UG Courses (B.A, B.Com, BCA, and B.Sc F.D), 04 PG Courses (Hindi, Economics, Maths and Sociology), 01 PG Diploma and 02 Add-on Courses. Detail of Coursesalready given in College Profile.

Following procedures have been adopted for effective curriculum delivery and its transactions.

Being affiliated to Panjab University Chandigarh, the institution follows
the norms and curriculum designed by it. Our faculty members, who are in
Board of Studies, in the University attend the meetings and give
constructive suggestions, whenever needed. The college insures effect the

- curriculum delivery by preparing and providing well planned academic calendar and schedule of work at start of the session.
- Following the changes, study materials are modernized and updated and regulary the students are acknowledged about it.
- Current books and Journals are made available in the library for the good of the staff and the students.
- Faculty members are stimulated to use Audio visual techniques the Internet, Interactive Board and Interactive LCD Projectors for making teaching effective and long lasting.
- Eminent persons from other colleges and universities are invited for the extension lectures.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalization of the curriculum?

## **Industry**

The institution motivates the various departments to organize trips and tours to industries related to their subjects (printing press, textile industries, food industry, milk processing units etc.),in order to enhance the effective operationalization of the curriculum and to put theory into practice .All these trips are well-planned and prove to be fruitful in their purpose and intent. During last five years industrial visits were organized by various departments.

- In session 2009-10, 02 Industrial visits were organized by department of Home Science and Fashion Designing for Chankya Dairy Products and Subhash Polytec. Ltd. In Gyaspura, Ludhiana.
- In session 2010-11, 02 Industrial visits were organized by the departments of English and Home Science for Danik Bhaskar and Chanakya Dairy Products, Focal Point at Mandi Gobindgarh
- In session 2011-2012, 01 Industrial Visit was organised by Department of Home Science for 'Vardhaman Spinning and General Mills', Ludhiana.

In session 2012-2013 Six educational visit/trips were arranged by various departments.

- A Trip to popular fashion house named "SEO Collection" at Jagroan on 2<sup>nd</sup> Oct, 2012.
- An educational trip of 43 students was organized by Commerce Department on 7<sup>th</sup> Oct, 2012 to 'Paresan Agriculture Works' at Ludhiana.
- An industrial visit to Markfed Jalandhar was organized by Commerce Department on 23 Oct, 2012.40 Students got an opportunity to learn food processing at Markfed.
- Home Science Department organized a visit of 42 students of B.A.I at Chanakya Dairy Products Ltd. Mandi Gobindgarh on 9.11.2012
- An Educational trip to Dainik Bhaskar, Sirhind was organized by English Department for all the students of Functional English (B.A.I,II and III) and English Hons. (B.A. II Hons III) on 16.11.12.
- A second industrial visit to Markfed, Jalandhar was organized by Commerce Department on 24<sup>th</sup> Nov, 2012.
- In session 2013-2014, 03 Industrial visits were organized by the departments of Commerce, Home Science and Fashion Designing

#### **Research Bodies:**

Interactions are carried out with research bodies for carrying out research work, faculty development programmes and for arranging the talks or extension lectures of resource persons. Members of faculty are encouraged to take up membership of professional research bodies and participate in research activities. College Principal is life member of Indian Society of Industrial and Applied Mathematics, Life Member of Journal of National Academy of Mathematics, INDIA and Life Member of Association of Indian College Principals.

#### **University:**

Financial Assistance is being provided from time to time by university to hold seminar/conferences. The grant of Rs. 31,000/- from Panjab University Chandigarh for National Conference in Mathematics vide Sanction no. 1898-2929 dated 15-10-2013 was obtained. The University further makes arrangement for Faculty development Programme, Subject experets, Scholarship for meritorious students.

1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University? (Number of staff members/departments represented on the Board of Studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stakeholder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.

The institution is affiliated to Panjab University, Chandigarh. It does not have autonomous status to formulate its own curriculum. But some of our faculty members have been or are members of Board of studies, faculties, Academic Council and other academic bodies for analyzing the feedback on the curriculum and are conveyed to the university to consider them in their board of study meetings.

Various staff members being part of different Co- Academic bodies and being members of Board of Studies of Under Graduate and Post Graduate Board of Studies and being participants of various Conferences/Workshops have contributed a lot towards the development of the curriculum by the University

These members give their suggestions to improve the quality and division of the syllabus by including the current trends in the syllabus.

(Details of contribution of the institution by staff members of various departments represented on Board of Studies given as Annexure A3)

The mechanism evolved for collecting feedback is the regular meetings of the bodies instituted for this purpose:-

**Students:** Students' feedback is taken from the meetings of central association. Every student is assigned a Tutorial group under the guidance of a teacher and the Central Association of the college comprises of students from all categories like Sports, Academic and Co-academic activities. They assist the college administrator in maintenance of discipline and cleanliness.

**Alumni:** Alumni meets are conducted from time to time to get the evaluative feedback including the issues of Book Bank facility, Scholarships and

infrastructure facilities. Meetings of the Alumni Association were conducted from 15<sup>th</sup> Sept. 2014 to 19<sup>th</sup> Sept. 2014 for the above stated purpose.

**Parents:** Parents are mobile participants in the Institutional activities. A healthy interaction with the parents is facilitated and encouraged from time to time regarding University norms, discipline and curricular and co-curricular activities.

**Academic Peers:** The valuable feeback from Academic Peers is collectd informally through interaction with the eminent personalities and resource persons at Naitonal Conferences, Seminars, Workshops and the meetings of Board of Studies.

**Community:** The members coming from almost all houses of the Society including, Print and Electronic media, Business Houses, Banks, Schools, Colleges, Universities, Income Tax Departments, Insurance, Police Dept., NGO's, Government Agencies, Music, Dance, Theatre etc. are given Invitation at regular intervals to get the valuable assessment on the curriculum. (Details of feedback from Stakeholders will be presented on the On-Site Visit of the NAAC Peer Team)

1.1.7 Does the institution develop curriculum for any of the courses offered (other than those under the purview of the affiliating university) by it? If 'yes' give details on the process (Needs Assessment', design, development and planning) and the courses for which the curriculum has been developed.

The institution is affiliated to Panjab University and the syllabus and curriculum is designed and developed by the members of the Board of Studies. The Institution aims at all around grooming of disciples. This grooming is coupled with the quality enhancement with the help of orientation programs. The faculty members, who are part of the Board of Studies, do make effective changes in the curriculum designing and planning. Short term courses other than those offered by the university are designed. Keeping in view the growing demand and relevance of communication skills in English the college offers skill orientation certification in the following courses which are not under the preview of the affiliating university.

- (i) College levelcrash courses are being run according to curriculum planned by the college.
- (ii) Personality Development: Two-day Personality Development Workshop is organized every year to chisel and refine the overall development and personality of the students and to help them face the challenges of the world when they walk out of the portals of the college.
- (iii)Keeping in view the employability of students at present the college is running 06 Crash Courses named as Crash Course in Spoken English, Crash Course in Computer Application, Crash Courses in Internet and Basic Computers, Crash Course in English to Hindi Translation, Crash Course in Fine Arts, Crash Course in Fashion Designing, Crash Course in Personality Development

### 1.1.8 How does institution analyze/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

Value based education and grooming the students as per the current requirements of industry/society are the objectives of the curriculum, for the

achievement of which regular meetings are held involving Principal, and Members of advisory committee.

- It is mandatory for the faculty members to get the copy of latest syllabus for the allocated classes from the library.
- Time table is displayed at the beginning of the session showing the detail of classes allocated to them.
- 1<sup>st</sup> House Test in September and 2<sup>nd</sup> House Test in December are conducted and softcopy of results is prepared. The same is conveyed to the parents through mail.
- 02 to 04 Class tests per month are given to the students by each staff member and marks obtained are recorded and analyzed by the Heads of Departments and Dean Academics. Necessary steps are taken for further improvement.
- Special tests and Special Classes for students who do not qualify the University condition.
- Assignments are given on various topics to both UG and PG students along with mock tests for PG Students only.
- Assessment is based on specific criteria.
- College pass percentage is compared with University pass percentage.
- Tutorials are held regularly to guide and to monitor the progress of the students.
- The institution ensures that the teachers are thorough with the objectives of the curriculum.
- The performance of the faculty regarding the completion of the syllabus and the revision work undertaken is also supervised.
- The University results are reviewed by the Principal and the members of the Management.
- Feedback from students, parents & external examiners for conducting practical exams/viva-voice is taken.

#### 1.2 Academic Flexibility

1.2.1 Specifying the goals and objectives give details of the certificate/diploma/skill development course etc. offered by the institution.

With the goal of empowering the women and making her economically independent, the following Add on Courses, besides 18 elective subjects in BA, B.Com, BCA & B.SC F.D and 04 PG Courses, and college level courses are being offered by the Institution:-

#### • COMMUNICATIVE ENGLISH

A graduate with effective communication tools in his professional kitty will find it easy to get adjusted everywhere, be it a multi-national company, corporate sector or indigenous projects of the nation.

#### COMPUTER BASED ACCOUNTING

Present era is of modernization and globalization. Computer plays a very vital role in modernization. With the knowledge of Computer Based Accounting every one of us will be able to maintain the accounting records if we want to become an entrepreneur. So knowledge of computerized accounting is not only helpful to the persons to maintain their business records but also helpful to those who want to get job in MNCs or big industries.

The Certificate/diploma/advanced Diploma course is open to regular student of college at any level.

Duration: Each course is of one academic year.

Besides this the college is running 06 Crash Courses at present.

- Programmes like B.Com, B.CA, PGDCA and Post Graduate courses in Hindi, Economics, Sociology and Mathematics have a significant skill component.
- The college offers various options like Fashion Designing, Fine Arts, Music (I), Physical Education, Functional English and Computer Science that are skill developing and employment enhancing subjects. Short term courses in Computer and spoken English are organized for staff and students.

### 1.2.2 Does the institution offer programmes that facilitate twinning/dual degree? If 'yes' give details.

As per the rules of the affiliating university, twinning /dual degree is not permitted by the institution. But add-on-courses (Communicative English, E-commerce, Spoken English)and Honours in English and B.Com can be pursued by the students alongwith the regular degrees. Besides this in time to come the college is planning to start Add-on courses in field of Journalism and Management, Bank Management, E-Banking and Yoga.

1.2.3 Give details on the various institutional provisions with reference to academic flexibility and how it has been helpful to students in terms of skills development, academic mobility, progression to higher studies and improved potential for employability Issues may cover the following and beyond.

Out of a total of 47 elective subjects being offered by Panjab University,

Chandigarh, our college offers 18 Elective Subjects, 29 Subject combinations. PG Diploma: 01, UG: 04, PG: 04, Career-Oriented Programs: 02.

The elective subjects are offered to encourage inter-disciplinary academic pursuits and to enhance students' competency and job prospects. The institution provides flexibility to the students in making choice of the elective options depending on their interest and requirement

At present affiliating university does not permit to adopt any Choice Based Credit system. The affiliating university does not allow any lateral mobility in the courses, however as allowed by the affiliating university, vertical mobility is provided by the institution by offering the following courses-

- M.A (Eco.), M.A (Hindi), MA (Soc.) & M.Sc (Maths) for moving up from BA.
- PGDCA for movement up from any of the under-graduate courses.
- Diploma and Advanced Diploma Courses as add-on-courses for vertical movement from certificate courses.
- Academic flexibility of Add on Courses in Communicative English & Computer Based Accounting and Crash Courses in terms of time is available for the students to complete their programme of study as per the norms of the affiliating university.
- Flexibility to the students to move from one discipline to another. The College allows a change from one discipline/faculty to another with the time frame of one month. The college permits B.A I students to change elective subjects within the time frame of ten days. Besides that academic flexibility is being adopted in all crash courses being run by the college.
- Students opting for B.A, BCA, B.Sc, and B.Com study English and Punjabi as compulsory subjects. Students who have not studied Punjabi till 10<sup>th</sup>class can opt for History and culture of Punjab in place of Punjabi.

Courses like B.Sc Fashion Designing and Elective subjects like Home Science, Computer Science, Functional English, and Fine Arts are helpful to the students in terms of skills development. Various PG programs offered in the College like PGDCA, Masters in Economics, Hindi and Sociology, Mathematics help the learners to acquire degrees suitable for placements in teaching and other sector. The degrees such as B.Com and BCA open many streams for the students to start their careers. Keeping in view the requirements of the students, study material is updated from time to time and the College Career Cell constantly helps the students with the upcoming placement opportunities. The college also offers Add-on-course in Computer Based Accounting and Communicative English.

1.2.4 Does the institution offer self-financed programmes? if 'yes' list them and indicate how they differ from other programmes, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc.

The institution offeres 04 UG Courses- BA,BCom, BCA and B.Sc (F.D) and 04 PG Courses- M.A Hindi, M.A Economics, MSc Maths, M.A Sociology and 01 PG Diploma and out of these the College offers following self-financed programs-

• Under Graduate Courses :- B.Com, BCA, B.Sc (F.D)

• Post Graduate Courses: - M.A.(Hindi), M.A.(Economics), M.A.(Sociology), M.Sc.(Maths), PGDCA.

The admission is as per the University guidelines. The curriculum and fee structures are also decided by the University. Faculty is qualified as per the University norms. The institution meets the additional expenses from its own resources.

The institution has appointed well qualified, experienced faculty members who possess good subject knowledge. The salary is not a constraint, only the knowledge and quality aspects qualify the faculty members with good salary. The revenue generated through self-financed courses is utilized in strengthening the infrastructure and updating the labs and the library of the college. Appointment of the staff for these self-financed courses is as per UGC/PU norms. In case of non-availability of eligible faculty, qualified teachers are appointed on short-term and long term contracts and are paid handsome salaries.

The fees/funds and other charges received from the students of self financed courses are in accordance with the rules/ decision of the University/ Government/College Governing Body. The list of such programmes and fee structure for the session 2014-2015 is as under:-

regular financed courses to cover the remuneration for the faculty of the self-financed stream.

1.2.5 Does the college provide additional skill oriented programmes, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programme and the beneficiaries.

Yes, the college provides additional skill oriented programmes relevant to regional and global employment markets. However the programmes like Fashion Designing, Computer Applications, being offered in the college help the students to acquire useful skills relevant to the regional and global employment markets. The graduates of Fashion Designing get practical knowledge of becoming independent entrepreneurs by opening their own designing centers and boutiques.

To meet the global employment markets needs, the college has IQAC (Internal Quality Assurance Cell) and Career Guidance Cell for framing the additional skill programme for the students. Besides that 06 Crash Courses are being run by the college. Personality Development Workshop is another regular feature of the institution.

During preparation of items for youth & heritage festival, experts are invited and a huge amount is spent on the training of students in dances, music, theatre items. Our own faculty members improve the student's debate & education skills, knitting, stitching & cooking skills which help them in developing their necessary skills and forge their way into the jobs market or set up their own enterprises. In last four years the college had spent Rs. 904101/- to enhance the skills of the students during youth festival.

1.2.6 Does the University provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face-to-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the course/combination of their choice" if 'yes' how does the institution take advantage for such provision for the benefit of students?

Yes, the institution does extend the flexibility of combining the face to face and distance mode of education facility being provided by Panjab University Chandigarh, to choose the course/ combination of their choice provided no practical/lab work is included in the curriculum of the course.

- A student of B.A or M.A after qualifying a part of programme as the regular college student may complete the rest of the programme through Distance Mode of Education except students having practical subjects. Similarly a student who has initially undertaken her B.A or M.A Coursesthrough Distance Mode of Education can undertake the rest of the programme as regular student.
- Students of B.A, B.Sc., B.Com and BCA, who fail to qualify for their respective Annual/Semester examinations for want of minimum conditions, are allowed to appear as private candidate in the Annual/Semester Examination of B.A Degree conducted by the university.
- Students of B.A who fail to qualify for the Annual Examination for want of minimum attendance of 75% and House Exam condition due to medical or any domestic problem are allowed to appear as private candidates in B.A Annual Examination conducted by the university.

#### 1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

## 1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic program and Institution's goals and objectives and integrated?

The academic programs offered by the University are in line with the institution's goals and objectives. The voice of the institution to fulfill the societal needs and demands is conveyed by the members of the Board of Studies from the institution and the members of facilities.

- Along with academic achievements, the institution encourages creativity, innovation and independent thinking on contemporary topics, debates, group discussions.
  - Pedagogical methods with ICT based teaching are followed to uplift the intellectual standards of the students. These activities are arranged by different Societies and Committees of the College. (Details of various Committees given as Annexure A4(i) to A4(v))
- Co-curricular and extra-curricular activities are organized with a focus to develop soft skills among the students.
- To inculcate leadership qualities and making the students aware of their social responsibilities, extension activities like NCC, NSS, Teej, Basant festivals, celebration of important days like Sadbhavana Divas, Sanskrit Divas, Teachers Day, Hindi Divas, Social Justice Day National Integration Day, Food Day, Birthday of Guru Nanak Dev Ji, Republic Day, Independence Day & Mother Language Day are arranged. These activities ensure that the goals & objectives of the institution are met with.
- During the previous years the college has organized many educational tours to various historical places, industries publication houses etc. (Details of Trips and Tours given as Annexure A5(i) to A5(viii))
- Lectures on current affairs are delivered in the class to make the students remain in touch with the changing world.
- Moral Value based lectures in the class rooms.
- Expert lectures in the campus to open new horizons for the students and the staff.
- Adoption of qualitative teaching-learning method
- Seminars, Debates, Workshops on national level are conducted.

## 1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

The teachers, who are the members of the faculty of the Panjab University, attend meetings with the University authorities to submit the demands based on the educational reforms and need for up gradation in the curriculum. The members of the Board of Studies also play an important role in this regard.

National Conferences, seminars, workshops exhibitions & counseling on curriculum are organized which increase the employability options for the students.

• Library is updated with magazines, latest issues of journals, newspapers for dynamic employment market.

• Extension lectures are organized by the career counseling & guidance cell for the outgoing classes, giving them knowledge about various jobs opportunities.

## 1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

The following measures are taken to ensure the integration of the above mentioned issues:

#### Gender Issues:-

- The institution being purely a women College does not face explicit gender issues or conflicts, however, the institution has constituted a Grievance Redressal and Gender Sensitization Committee against sexual harassment which conducts gender sensitization programs, such as lectures on Female Foeticide, women safety, health care, physical fitness.
- Issues concerning abuse against women are highly criticized through plays, skits, debates, declamations and activities like essay writing and poster making.

#### Human Rights:-

• During Monday Morning Assembly Anti Ragging instructions are provided to the students.

#### Environmental Education:-

- Environment education is a compulsory subject for all the undergraduate Programs as per the guidelines of Pb.Uni. Chandigarh
- Seminar was conducted to highlight importance of Human Rights.
- RTI Act is implemented strictly by the college authorities.

#### ICT:-

- ICT based courses like B.CA and PGDCA are offered by the college
- Computer Based Accounting as an Add-on Courses is offered in undergraduate classes.
- Students are given intensive coaching in the use of information technology and are given an open access to the latest books and journals
- College website is providing important information to students.

#### Awareness Programme:-

 Extension lectures are organized to aware the staff and students regarding health hazards of excessive use of mobile phones causes and cures of Breast Cancer, Search for Self etc.

### 1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?

For holistic development of the students various value-added and enrichment programme are offered by the institution in, formal and informal ways.

Moral and ethical values: -The Monday Morning Assembly presents healthy thoughts from the faculty members to guide them on the righteous path. The Youth Service club motivates the pupils to take part in Social service programs. The Punjabi "Virsa", which show cases a display of exhibits related with Punjabi Cultural is a commendable effort of the institution to keep the

students grounded to their roots. Community orientation programmes such as Blood Donation Camps, visit to Old Age Homes are organized. Personality development workshop is organized every year. In order to develop the quality of discipline among students, through practice, the faculty members are assigned discipline duties covering the lawns, canteen, verandas and all other places so as to avoid disturbance in studies.

**Employable and life skills:** -Many courses offered in the college such as, Computer Science, Home Science & Commerce stream equip the students for better job opportunities. The college also offers Add on Courses in Communicative English & Computer Based Accounting. Short term course in computers are arranged for staff and students.

**Better career options**: - Career Guidance & Counseling Cell of the college keeps the students well informed regarding better & lucrative career options.

Community Orientation: -The institution promotes a number of healthy Community orientation practices. For this, there are 2 NSS Units, which organize an annual 7 Days' Day/Night Camp in addition to many day camps in the college campus or in the slum areas adopted for the same. Adult literacy programs and tree plantation programs are the highlighting features of the college NSS. Interaction with the senior citizens at the old-age home is practiced by the college students to brief them with the sense of isolation among the old and the destitute. NCC unit of the college is also highly dynamic and has made the institution proud several times with the accomplishments of its cadets at statelevel. The College has Red Cross Society under which, annual blood donation camp is organized. The Red Ribbon Club helps the students to know about the deadly disease AIDS, Swine Flu etc. Crashcourses in communicative English help in polishing the speaking skills of the students. The Physical Education Department organizes sports Day which channelizes the energy of the youngsters in a positive way. The Youth Festival Committee brings out the hidden talents of the students and provides a healthy platform to them to exhibit their talents

### 1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

- The different subject societies hold time to time meetings with the students to collect information and feedback from them to enrich the curriculum
- The students are also free to air their views in the tutorial periods
- The Central Association, which is a democratically elected body of the students is highly instrumental in conveying the feedback of the students to the authorities and to bring about corrective measures

  On the basis of these suggestions, analysis and far-sighted approach of the Principal and Management, a number of new courses/subjects were
- (i) MA (Sociology) being an important subject of humanities and M.Sc (Maths) have been started on popular demand of stakeholders.
- (ii) In order to increase the employability of the students in Ludhiana, just 50 Km. away from Khanna and a big centre for Apparels, BS.C Fashion Designing was restarted in 2013-2014.
- (iii)B.A. Classical Dance was introduced in 2012-2013 to develop the soft skills among students.

introduced given as follows:-

- (iv)Add-on-courses in Communicative English and Computer Based Accounting were introduced in 2013-2014 after receiving feedback from the stakeholders.
- (v) Short term courses in Basic Computer Techniques, internet and spoken English are also helping students a lot and increase their employability in Multimedia corporations.

### 1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

- Regular oral and written class tests are conducted.
- Two House Exams are conducted to monitor the academic progress of the students
- Feedback is taken from nearby area people, students, staff and alumni.
- In order to adopt the accreditation quality sustenance measure an Internal Quality Assurance Cell came in to existence on 01-08-2005. Learning is a continuous process, the IQAC opts for the plans and programs that aim at the enrichment of the quality assurance of the college.

The IQAC is concerned about the issues including the matters as follows:-

- To bring forth new subjects and courses.
- Strengthening students with cultural and value oriented education.
- Opting for innovative teaching and learning process.
- Infrastructural improvements.
- Computerization in Administrative works.
- Industrial visits in order to endorse the vocational training.
- Social awareness and eco-friendly project enhancement efforts
- Scholarships for the deserving students.
- (b) The ultimate decision making power lies in the hands of the management. The proposals of IQAC are put into effect only when they are thumbed up by the management. Details regarding submission of Annual Quality Assurance Reports submitted to NAAC havealready been given in College Profile.

#### 1.4 Feedback System

## 1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

The institution is affiliated to Panjab University Chandigarh. So the curriculum and the syllabi are designed by the University under the Senate and Syndicate bodies. The faculty members, who are the members of Board of Studies, take active part in the curriculum designing and planning.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes' how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing change/new programmes?

One of the major concerns of the College is the Feedback from Stakeholders on teachers and students programme evaluation. Quality of education, the interaction between the teachers and the students, the curriculum, the co-curricular activities are some important issues that are discussed and viewed in the feedback.

The College adopts informal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on curriculum. The formal ways are practiced to do so through meetings and discussions, which are further conveyed to the University bodies by the members of Board of Studies of the College. Suggestion Box to obtain feedback from the parents is kept in the Visitor Room.

The student feedback is always very valuable for the growth of the Institute. Students opined that the teachers were sincere in their duties. They lend their hand in solving their personal issues also. The infrastructural facilities with special reference to the hostel facility were found satisfactory. Infact they felt honored to be a part of this reputable Institute.

Every student is assigned atutorial group under the guidance of a teacher, Tutorial group meetings are held in special period. The students are taught about moral values like discipline, social manners, courtesy, cleanliness and health and traffic rules. The lectures on inter-disciplinary topics like Computer Education, Home Management, Library awareness, Banking, Small Savings and Public Speaking etc. are conducted frequently.

#### 2.1 Student Enrollment and Profile

### 2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

#### **Publicity in the Admission Process:**

The college ensures publicity through the following procedure:

College Prospectus: A comprehensive and detailed document in the form of Prospectus is published every year. All relevant information regarding admission procedure,infrastructure, fee/funds/university charges, scholarships, last date for receipt of applications, various academic and co-academic activities of the college, migration rules, achievements of the students in academics and sports is conveyed through the prospectus.

**Advertisement in Newspapers:** Before the beginning of the new academic session, advertisements regarding admission schedule in all courses are given in all the prominent newspapers of the region at regular intervals so that students can take admission in time.

Pamphletsdepicting salient features and strengths of the College are also circulated in these Newspapers to ensure publicity in Admission Process.

Admission Promotion Programme and Workshops:-Posters, banners, pamphlets are used as a source of publicizing the date of admission and courses offered by the institution. In the beginning of the year i.e. in the month of January, a definite strategy is prepared for admission promotion. The college improves access to people who otherwise would not take initiative for higher education. Under admission promotion programme, teams of faculty members personally approach the Principals of different schools in the radius of 10 km.

College Website:-The college has an official website <u>www.ascwkhanna.com</u> which is regularly updated. All relevant information regarding admission procedure, fee/funds/university charges, scholarships, last date for receipt of applications, various academic and co-academic activities of the college, migration rules, achievements of the students in academics and sports and all other relevant information is placed on this website. Copy of the prospectus is downloaded on it for the ready reference. A well framed Admission committee consisting of sub-committees of all the courses of the college is formed. The admission process is uploaded on the college Website for convenience of the students. (Details of Last Year Admission Committee enclosed as Annexure A6(i) to A6(iii)).

**Admission Promotion Workshop:**-Admission promotion workshops are organized well in advance in which teachers and students from adjoining areas

are invited to visit the campus and to have a firsthand knowledge about the institution.

Promotional CD has been prepared to give a glimpse into the functioning of A.S. College for Women, Khanna. Achievements of the students are also read out formally by the Principal through college report with LCD Presentation at the annual function.

**Transparent Admission procedure:-**There is absolute transparency in the admission process. A well framed Admission committee consisting of admission sub-committees of all the courses of the college for the smooth and transparent admission process has been framed. As already mentioned the College Prospectus and the College Website brings transperancy in Admission Process. As per University rules the admission to B.Com is purely on merit basis and this list is displayed on the notice board to bring transperancy.

On the very first day of admission, Principal holds a meeting to guide the teaching & non-teaching staff of the college to convey all the guidelines of University for admission of the session and about all the admission committees of different courses of the college that have been framed by the Principal. All are advised to verify the relevant documents of the students thoroughly before recommending and putting up the forms of admission and displaying the merit list on the notice board.

Before start of summer vacations, departmental meetingsare held to have analysis of admission criteria, choice of subject combinations, drop out analysis etc. to make strategy for admission for the next session.

- The institution abides by the norms and regulations set up by the affiliating university regarding the admission and selection of the students for various courses.
- -For B.Com the merit list is displayed on the notice board on pre-announced dates and candidates are called for interview. However, for B.A. and our other PG courses, the principle of first come first serve is followed as the college has limited number of seats as compared to demand of the region. The reservation policy of the govt. is also followed.
- Students with better intellect and brilliance are counseled to go for the elective subjects. Admission committee also reviews the admission process and student profiles annually. During the review the aspects of admission criteria, enrolment trend, choice of subject combinations, demand, ratio, student's quality etc. are thoroughly discussed to device further strategies.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'Yes', what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

The institution does have a well defined mechanism in form of the advisory committee and Admission Committee to review the admission process annually. (Details of Admission Committee given in Annexure A6(i) toA6(iii)) Internal Quality Assurance Cell is also an initiative in this regrd.

There is a provision for the assemblage of the Heads of the Departments before the admission and at the end of every session. The faculty requirements are full-filled according to the demands of the coming sessions. Appointments are also made accordingly.

The profiles of all the students are reviewed by the members of the admission committee. They are offered counseling regarding choice of subjects and the combinations keeping inview the aptitude and future scope. The academic and the co-academic progress of the students is monitored. The needy and deserving students are awarded scholarships so that the financial hurdle should not come in their way.

The late admission cases that get admission after permission from the vice-chancellor of the University are allowed to attend the extra classes, arranged by the College in recess period (working days) and in Autumn-Winter Break (non-working days).

This well defined mechanism being adopted in Last four years has helped the College to have a sharp rise in giving opportunities to the students to excel in Academics, Co-Academics and the most important is that they have learnt to channelize their dynamic energy into constructive and positive directions. This attempt, no doubt has gone a long way in improving the overall results of the college.

2.1.5 Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase/improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate/reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion.

Every effort is made to enhance the institution's commitment to accommodate the needs of candidates hailing from diverse groups.

To make higher education accessible to the needy, less privileged learners and sparkling gems of the college in academic and co-academic, numerous scholarships were made available. Besides, this college has liberally granted financial aid to meritorious students, sport persons, financially weak and other needy students out of Government fund, management fund and student aid fund. The details are given as below:-

- SC/ST and OBC: There is an endeavor to provide fee-concession to the students belonging to SC/ST and OBC. There is also a provision to grant scholarships to them by the Punjab Government.
- Women:Being committed to promote women education, the College was upgraded from the status of a Girls' wing to full-fledged college.As an initiative, the college has made a provision of serving 2 seats for single girl child in B.Com I.Efforts are made to make the students self-reliant to lead a dignified life in the global world of today.
- **Differently Abled Students:** It is ensured that the classrooms and washrooms are kept on the ground floor for the convenience of the differently-abledstudents. They are dealt with compassion. At the same time efforts are made to make them confident and self-reliant through constant counseling and guidance. During examination also, special care is taken that ground floor rooms should be allotted to the physically challenged students.
- Economically Weaker Sections: Scholarships and fee concessions are allowed by the management for the students belonging to economically weaker sections. Some of the faculty members also provide financial help to the needy students. Books and study material is provided to them from the library and the book bank. The College feels proud to reiterate the generous fee- remittance to the students who apply for fee- concession. For this purpose, special Fee- concession Committee has been framed in the institution.
- **Minority Community:** There is a provision from the Central Government policy for providing scholarships to the pupils belonging to Minority Communities.
- **Sports Students:** The outstanding Sports students are given generous feeconcessions. Free track-suits and cash prizes are also given to the students, who win medals at the University and Inter- University levels.

- Students good at performing Co-Academic Activities: The subjects of Music (I), Fine Arts, and Classical Dance have been introduced topromote culture and heritage. The institution has been showing excellent results in the field of music, theatre and dance. Outstanding performers are given scholarships/financial aid, awards and honors.
- The admission policy of the college is taking proper care to follow the reservation guidelines for SC, OBC, Differently-abled and Single-girl child category as being guided by the affiliating University from time to time. 

- The admission in most of the under graduate courses and all the post graduate courses show upward growth, indicating the trust of the students and their parents in our institution.
- The decline in the strength of BCA is in tune with the general decline in the degree in the other institutions of the region as well. The reason might be the increase in interest in other available streams but still we are trying and expecting upward growth in BCA in times to come.
- B.Sc Fashion Designing had to be stopped in 2012-13 due to non availability of Regular Staff. This Course was restarted with w.e.f session 2013-14 and during the Session we have got a very good response in B.Sc Fashion Designing.

#### 2.2 Catering to students diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

Comforting and sufficing infrastructure facilities are provided to them so that they should not feel, being disabled is hurdle for them. The institution has given these students all the necessary facilities in term of reservation of seats, fee-concession and other requirements as per the Government/University

- The provision of ground floor classrooms is there for their convenience.
- The administrative, library and teaching staff is directed to give special attention to help themwhenever required.
- During house examination as well as University examinations, differently abled students are accommodated on the ground floor only.
- All the Government policies are strictly followed and adhered to in order to provide scholarships to them.
- Time to time counseling is provided to enable them to become self-sufficient in the future.
- The fellow studentsespically NCC Cadtes, NSS volunteers and CA members are motivated to extend helping hand to them.
- Every member of the college is instructed to accommodate such students so that they are not conscious of their disability.

## 2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes, there is a provision for assessing student's knowledge and skill before the commencements of the program. The strategy includes following steps-

- All the students get hold of the college Prospectus. They are advised to go through the rules and regulations of the college depicted in College Prospectus before filling up the admission forms through which, knowledge is gathered regarding the various skills and talents of the students in academic and co- academic skills.
  - The faculty goes through the forms submitted by the students thoroughly before admitting them in the courses offered by them.
- If a student is not comfortable with the choice of a subject, there is an option to change the subject within a permissible span of time.
- Tutorial groups are held to inculcate ethical values and to bridge the knowledge gap of the incoming students from different background.
- Students are also encouraged to choose one of the Add- on courses on the basis of their interest. Percentage of marks in the lower examination is taken into consideration to form an assessment of the academic ability of the students, so that the required strategy is framed for best results.
- The institution works on the stratagems of awarding fee concessions, scholarships and awards to the deserving students.
- 2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/Add on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

The students are familiarized with the working of the college, its rules and regulations and remedial policies offered.

- First few days in the classrooms are devoted to understand the knowledge gap of the students and the syllabus is started from familiar to different topics.
- Introductory lectures are very helpful for the students who have changed their stream and are on way to study a new subject, as in case of students of commerce stream pursuing B.A. degree.
- After being specified slow learners are helped by Dean Academics of the college. Central Association, which is the representative body of the students, serves as a major link between the students, staff and Principal of the College.
- Remedial classes, especially in the subject of Compulsory English are arranged in order to bring up the level of weaker students to the average level.
- The meritorious students are advised to help the weaker students, thereby encouraging the concept of Peer learning.
- In order to increase the English language proficiency, there is a provision for an Add-on-Course in Communicative English.
- The students are encouraged to take up Add- on courses to hone their skills for the job opportunities.
- The brilliant students are given extra attention. They are encouraged to use the library resources to the maximum by reading extra books and journals to keep themselves abreast of the changing global trends.
- Staff members are encouraged to take lecture in the Conference hall equipped with all modern teaching facilities.

### 2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

Grievance Redressal Committee & Gender Sensitization Committee against Sexual Harassment:-Grievance cell helps students to communicate directly with the authorities regarding such issues. The college is committed to spread the awareness of gender equality and oneness of all beings, through lectures, declamation contests, essay writing competitions and poster or slogan writing competitions by Departmental Associations and Club Activities. Movies based on Women empowerment are shown to the students. Lectures on problems relating to women like female foeticide, dowry and violence against women, Breast Cancer, AIDS,Swine Flu are organized to prepare them to face challenges undauntingly.

Environment related issues: - Sensitization of the staff and students towards environmental issues is also one of the major concerns. It is done through the means like student counseling, by holding periodical meetings headed by the Principal, Staff members & the students. NSS and NCC wing of the college plays an important role in reinforcing the need for preserving the environment, promotion of adult education programs and the emphasis on general health and hygiene.

## 2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The students of today are the future of the Nation. The college pays a special attention to boost the performance of the advanced learners by

providing them with a congenial learning environment and by offering them extra facilities.

- The students having better learning power are picked and given special consideration to achieve higher goals.
- The advanced learners are identified and are encouraged to get university ranks. The College feels proud to announce that the last year <u>Ms.Alisha of B.A I has brought laurels to the institution by bagging covetous First Position in the University Examination held by Panjab University, Chandigarh.</u>
- They are provided with Career guidance through the Career Guidance cell of the college.
- The progressive learners are stimulated to join the Readers' Club and are constantly motivated to read extra books and study material available in the library to compete in the international world.
- The meritorious students are awarded and honored in the College Assembly to provide motivation to the fellow students to excel like their brilliant counterparts.
- In order to motivate the students, prizes are given to the toppers of the house examination in the annual prize distribution function to set an example for other students.
- These students are given an opportunity to interact with external resource persons visiting the institution at different occasions.
- The institution identifies special educational needs of conducting class tests and presentations in academic year, which help in evaluating the students.
- When these progressive learners are appearing in their final year examinations, the library staff/teachers keep an eye on admission notices of different institutions and universities and inform them for timely applications for pursuing higher education.
- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the program duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?
- At start of the Session General Office is advised to go through the Admission forms and analyze the data regarding the Disadvantaged sections of the Society, Physically Challenged, Slow Learners and economically weaker section of the Society and the data is further thoroughly analyzed by Fee Concession Committee under guidance of College Principal.
- Remedial Classes for the disadvantaged sections of society and slow learners are organized out of College funds and out of UGC grant received for the same
- Special Infrastructure facilities are given to Physical Challenged students.

- Attention is given by Career Counselling incharge to these students suffering from psychological fear or depression and even time table adjustments are also made for such students and for the students coming from remote areas.
- Special Test provision and consolation of 10% lectures by the Principal of the College is also provided to minimize the dropout rate of students from disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections, in addition to the fee concessions and scholarships provided to them.

#### 2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

## 2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc)

Academic Calendar:-Panjab University issues the broad outline of the academic calendar. Academic Calendar of the institution is planned before the beginning of the session according to the Panjab University.

In Annual System, the session is comprised of three terms and in semester system session comprises of two terms. Detail has already been given in 1.1.2. The detailed instructions regarding Members of faculty, Academic calendar, Co-academic calendar, Details of courses with syllabus, Intimation of Tuition fee payment, Intimation of monthly exams and College rules & regulations are printed in the Prospectus of the College.

#### Teaching Plan:-

- Proper Unitization of the syllabus is done by the Heads of various Departments and formal printed Schedule of Work is distributed among all students and teaching staff members of the College. A well planned schedule is chalked out to facilitate the timely completion of the syllabus and revision.
- The department meetings are held frequently to ensure that the schedule of academic calendar is implemented. The question papers for house examinations based on pre-determined course/syllabus are formed.

#### **Evaluation blue print**

- A minimum of 75% attendance is required in each course.
- Two house examinations are held for the courses with Annual Examination system and one House Examination is conducted for semester system classes. Evaluation of answer sheets is completed within 7 days and the results are published within 2 weeks of the conduct of the exam.
- Students are evaluated by conducting class tests, monthly tests; the schedule of which is given well in advance to the students.
- Internal assessment of the students is based on the performance of the students in the house exams and class tests.
- Parent-Teacher-Principal meets are held for the benefit of the students as per schedule mentioned in Academic Calendar of the College Prospectus.
- Progress reports are prepared and sent to the parents by post.
- 2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

The IQAC aims at introspecting and assessing the strengths and weaknesses of the college. IQAC monitors the entire academic program through its members. The suggestions made are implemented for the improvement in teaching—learning process. Following points /suggestions have been implemented by IQAC:-

- The IQAC co-ordinator encourages the teaching faculty members to come prepared with the lectures to be delivered in the class room.
- The students are allowed to speak freely so that the actual class room difficulties are noted and rectified by taking immediate and appropriate action.
- The departments are encouraged to develop acquaintance with recent techniques and tools and enrichment programmes like exhibitions and seminars/workshops are also organized for this purpose.
- New Books and Magazines are added in the Library to refresh its stock.
- Power point demonstrations are introduced whenever possible to engage the students more deeply into the subjects.
- System of feedback from students has been further streamlined.
- Teachers are motivated to take up research projects.
- Facilitating support for inter disciplinary programmes, faculty development programmes and research activities.
- Technology up gradation in the department of BCA, Fine Arts, Physical Education and Music has been done.
- The IQAC extends conferences/seminars/extension lectures with Financial Assistance from the university/UGC/ICSSR/DST etc.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

Right from the time a student enters the portals of the college she is counseled, motivated, correctedand her energies are channelized in the best possible manner. In order to make learning more student-centric, the following support structures and systems are available for teachers:-

- Before the commencement of the syllabus, students are motivated to create an interest in their subjects.
- In addition, students are taught with the help of charts and models. Students are updated on the latest/recent developments in the relevant subjects, so as to create their curiosity and by developing a healthy habit among them to refer to library and media sources.
- The learning process is made more student-centric with the facilities available in the computer labs along with enriched pedagogical practices.
- The college has a big auditorium and a spacious seminar hall which provides a platform for the students to exchange views, share ideas on current social, economic, political, cultural and literary issues.
- Students are always the center of all the activity in the college. In order to bring out their hidden talents, Talent hunt function is held in the college. On the basis of their outputs, students are further helped to polish their skills and motivated to take part in the Youth Festivals.

- Efforts are made to build the personality of the students in a well-rounded way by coaxing them into play different sports, take part in NCC, NSS and different Club activities.
- Democratic elections are held every year in the college to form Central Association of the students. This practice instills confidence among the learners
- College 'Avastha Magazine' gives the opportunity to promote creativity.

To develop skills following support structures and systems are available:-

- Library and e-resources are regularly updated.
- Computer facility with internet is provided to the students and teachers through INFLIBNET providing 6000 e-journals and besides this 75 journals are also subscribed for students and staff of the College.

## 2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among` the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

The teachers consistently work hard to nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators. This is done through the following initiatives devised by the faculty:

- Interdisciplinary competitions are organized to chisel the creative minds.
- The college provides open access to educational and life-long learning opportunities by inculcating healthy habits like, discipline, leadership, entrepreneurship, havan etc. thereby contributing to the social, cultural and economic development of our region.
- To develop the creative and Mathematical skills of the students the College holds exhibitions, contests and competitions in respective fields.
- The wall magazine also serves the same purpose of giving an opportunity to the students to exhibit their creative self.
- The students get ample opportunities through the Home Science and Fashion Designing Departments to excel in cooking, dress designing, embroidery, interior designing etc. to promote the participation of students in cultural activities like music, theatre, dances and fine arts.
- The students prepare assignment/projects/presentations and participate in Extensions lectures/seminars/conferences.
- Lifelong learning is ensured by providing moral education to them through the 'Thought of the Day' in the morning assembly etc.
- The college organizes youth festivals, plays, movies etc.
- . The Central Association of the college plays an important role in bringing out the leadership qualities among the students.
- 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The institution is aware about the importance of technologies and facilities to be used by the faculty for effective teaching and maximum

efforts are made to provide the latest facilities and equipments It is housed in a magnificent triple storey building of its own with well equipped spacious playgrounds, sprawling lawns with blooming flowers, Gymnasium hall, Home science labs, Language labs, Computer labs, Fashion Designing lab, Fine arts room, a huge well stocked airconditioned library and a double storey Hostel with all modern facilities. There are many facilities for the studentslike very spacious Canteen, Common Room, Reading room, T.V and Video Room, Mini Hall, Computer Labs, Readers' Club, Youth Welfare Club and facility of teaching with Interactive Board and Interactive LCD Projectors. A new Hi-Tech Conference Hall has been built, which is another feather in our cap and construction of Common Room for girls is in full swing. The college has a big Auditorium, where all functions and cultural programmes are organized. The college has air conditioned, fully furnished and well equipped library with Reading Room & Reference Section with more than 25990 books on all subjects. It subscribes to 15 Newspapers, 75 Journals/Periodicals along with internet facility for free e-journals for the benefit of students and the staff members. (Details of Journals/Periodicals enclosed as Annexure A7 (i) to A7(iii)). The college also provides Book Bank facility. Detail has already been given in 2.1.5.

Faculty members are allowed to attend Refresher Courses and General orientation courses organized by the Univerity for brushing up the faculty and make them acquaint with the latest changes in teaching learning procedures. It goes a long way for benefit of the students.

Staff members are motivated to use the following technologies and facilities for effective teaching and giving the best to the students of the Institution.

- The Department of Computer Science has the latest software for advance learning. The faculty members use latest websites for enriching the learning experience of the students.
- The Home Science Laboratories are very well equipped to conduct cooking and stitching practicals.
- In Fashion Designing Department, extensive use of charts and models is made.
- There are two Functional Language Labs one Manual and another Computer Based Functional English Lab.
- The college library is computerized and well-stocked for the benefit of the teachers and the taught.
- The institution has access to vast resources of e-journals and books that are useful for teaching-learning, educational, counseling, mentoring, assessment and research purposes.
- Movies which are a part of the curriculum are shown to the students. It is more informatory for them.
- 2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?
- It enhances the knowledge of faculty members and students. Prominent scholars, educationalists and experts are invited to share their views.

- Project works are assigned to the PG students for the exposure of their knowledge and skills.
- Industrial visits and educational trips are organized by the college to give a firsthand knowledge to the students regarding their respective fields.
- Workshops, Seminars and Extension Lectures are arranged. Eminent scholars are invited for such activities to make the students well prepared for the modern competitive world. During last five years and till date the College had organized 139 Workshop/Conference/GuestLectures/Seminars. (Details of Workshop/Conference/Guest Lectures /Departmental Activities/Seminarsgiven as AnnexureA8(i) toA8(xii)).
- The college stands ahead of its neighboring institutions as the college has the privilege of having various departments laced with the facility of computer and internet. The post graduate students are encouraged to make the most of the internet facility.
- The faculty members regularly attend Refresher courses and orientation programs to update their knowledge and skills. They also participate in seminars and conferences.
- Faculty members have also written Research papers which are published in various reputed national, international and peer journals.
- The 'Call of Participation' communication/e-mails received from other institutions are circulated to the faculty members so that they may prepare and participate in different international/national/regional seminars and workshops.
- The Career Guidance and Placement cell of the college keeps a track of the available job opportunities, recruitment, examinations, admission notice etc. and renders career counselling and professional guidance to students.
- According to the socio-economic spectrum of the students, the final year students are given academic advice to pursue higher studies and other career option.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students\benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/ mentoring/ academic advise) provided to students?

The students are constantly guided and supported by the teachers through the year. A number of students are benefited through this support and guidance. This is done through the following methods:-

#### **Academic Support:-**

- Academic support is provided to the students in the beginning of the session. They are advised to choose the subjects and streams.
- For changing the subject, the teachers as well as the head of the institution provide proper counselling to the students. The choice of the students depends upon her the performance in the lower exam passed as well as in the present class.
- Counseling is provided to the students, whenever they face any personal or psycho-social problem. Sometimes, the parents are also invited to resolve such issues along with the teachers.

- Special emphasis is laid on personal interaction between the students and teachers outside the classroom.
- Students are also motivated to participate in co-curricular activities. They are suggested to consult extra study material.

#### Personal and psycho-social support:-

- Addressing & sorting out their problems by the senior most teacher and Incharge, Central Association.
- Assisting the students financially.

#### **Guidance services:-**

• Giving them counselling to participate in sports and cultural and coacademics activities at university, state & national and international level.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

In order to make teaching learning process more interesting, the college faculty keeps on introducing new methods such as:-

- Innovative practices such as group discussions, Power Presentation, use of LCDs, CDs and internet facilities are adopted.
- Students are given assignments on subject related topics.
- The Post Graduate students are also encouraged to prepare presentations and assignments. Quiz contests are arranged to sharpen the learning process of the pupils.
- To enhance the personality and improve the quality of teaching and learningNational Conferences are organized from time to time in the College.
- An extensive use of charts, models and samples is used by the faculty of Fashion Designing department.
- To encourage the habit of reading among the students, special prizes are given to those, who visit the library most frequently. The library Readers Club lays a special emphasis on developing the creativity among the students.
- Educational Tours and industrial visits are highly encouraged.
- In order to develop the communicative skills among the learners, debate and declamation contests are organized.
- Live Sketching techniques are used to teach Fine Arts students. Open environment for Live sketching of models, trees and Live Sceneries help the students to understand the use of different mediums like Sketching, Water Colors and Oil Colors.
- A chart showing availability of teachers in their free periods is put on notice board of the department so that students can discuss their individual subject problems.
- Experimental workshops are held for students.

### 2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The college has air conditioned, fully furnished and well equipped library with Reading Room & Reference Section with more than 25990 books on all subjects. It subscribes to 15 Newspapers, 75 / Journals/Periodicals along with internet facility through INFLIBNET N-List Programme for searching 6000+ e-journals (with back files for 10 years) and 97,000+ e-books. The facility is being widely used by faculty and students for research work. The college also provides Book Bank facility. In last four years, as many as 1781 students of the college got benefited from the Library Reader's Club facility and Book Bank Facility, Book Bank facility is specially meant for helping the needy and meritorious students.

- Library card is issued to the staff members & students. The resources available in the college library are notified to the students through circulars. Any new addition of books/journals or any access to new websites is notified through the Principal.
- The Readers' Club of the library organizes Essay writing and Poster Making contests in order to supplement classroom teaching and learning.
- There is a rich collection of reference Books in the library. Reference service is provided to the teachers.
- Photostat facility is provided to the teachers as well as the students.
- PG students are motivated to visit the Library regularly. Sometimes the teachers take the students to the Library.
- Library is not closed even during holidays, youthfestivals etc.
- The new arrivals are displayed on the library and College notice board for the convenience of the students.

# 2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If "yes", elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Every care is taken to complete the syllabus in time; hence no such challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame are faced. A complete college calendar for Academics and extracurricular activities is prepared well in advance. Pacing the paucity of times, adjustment of teaching periods for environment education, compulsory qualifying subjects for all the UG programme is another challenge for the time table committee. The institution has to arrange an assigned period according to the time table for this subject. The college plans its activities in such a manner that it does not disturb the routine class room teaching.

### 2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

- Regular meetings are held by Department Heads to monitor teaching learning process & regarding the progress of syllabus.
- Suggestion box is placed in the college visitor room where the parents of students can drop their suggestions and grievances, if any.
- House tests are conducted to evaluate the performance of the students. The teachers use this performance for marking the internal assessment. It also

- helps in identifying the weak and the brilliant students. Special tests are held for very weak students. The brilliant students are motivated to get university ranks.
- The results of the house tests are mailed to the parents of the students, so as to familiarize them with the performance of their wards.
- Corrective measures regarding curriculum delivery are taken at the departmental level or in discussion with the head of the institution. Time Table adjustment and work load of the teachers is made as per requirement.

#### 2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum.

- The college is always on the search for qualified and competent teachers. For new recruitments in the college, advertisements are put in the newspapers. Scrutiny of the applications is made and merit list is prepared according to the U.G.C/P.U guidelines.
- Recruitment of Regular Teaching Staff member (Aided or Un-Aided) is strictly made as guidelines of UGC/Panjab University, Chandigarh. The College makes a request to the university to appoint a panel of experts for conducting the interview. The interview panel consists of two subject experts deputed by the Panjab University, Principal of the College and the Chairman of the College Management Committee.
- To ensure the Human Resource, (Qualified and Competent teachers), a Temporary teacher is recruited on short term contract basis for two sessions and then reviewing his or her performance in teaching and other College Academic and Co-Academic activities, she/he is assigned Long Term Contract for three Years. At the time of Accreditation of the College in Session 2004-05, there were only 13 permanent teachers including the Principal besides 30 other Adhoc appointees and two part time teachers. In 2014-15, Total Teaching Staff (including Principal) is 56 out of which Permanent Teaching Faculty: 19 and Faculty on Long/Short Term Contract: 37.(List of Members of Faculty in Session 2014-15 given as Annexure A9(i) to A9(iii))
- By ensuring their active participation in the institutional activities/ goals, we have been quite successful in inculcating a deep sense of belonging and commitment among the temporary faculty. The teachers are given salary in time. A congenial atmosphere is provided to facilitate a healthy work environment.

2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

In 2012-13, M.Sc Mathematics, M.A Sociology and Classical Dance were introducedas an elective subject and in 2013-14,B.Sc F.D. and 02 Add-on Courses were introduced. The additional faculty to teach new specialized programmes was recruited on Regular/Contractual basis as per Punjab Govt. and University rules. As there is ban on recruitment of faculty against sanctioned posts since 2004, so staff on long term and short term basis is recruited. The workload is prepared by the Dean Academics and required number of posts are advertised in leading news papers of Khanna and also displayed on college website. The short-listed candidates are called for interview which is taken by experts from University or from other reputed institutions. Selection of the staff is only on merit basis. One retired staff member is appointed for a specific period of time. Staff members with good result record are continued without interview. Courses introduced during last 10 years are as below:-

2.4.3 Providing details on staff development programmes during the last four years elaborate on the strategies adopted by the institution in enhancing the teacher quality.

With the purpose of improving the Teaching-learning process, the institution arranges required faculty training programmes to improve and enable the faculty to make use of different tools and techniques. In this regard

the teaching Aids Cell, Examination Branch, Department of computer science and Central Library pay particular attention in respective spheres. - Workshop and conferences are conducted for intensifying the teacher quality.
- The temporary/Adhoc staff is carried forward in the coming session also.
- In most of the cases, the faculty on contractual basis is offered permanent employment.
- There is a provision of accession in the pay scale of the candidates having good skills and competence.

The faculty members are always inspired to pursue M.Phil & Ph.D degrees.

- 1) Teachers are granted leave to attend seminars & workshops.
- 2) College organizes workshops and seminars to recharge the teachers.
- 3) Study tours are organized by respective departments for field study.
- 4) Teachers are facilitated with the computers, latest books and study leave.
- 5) Their time-table are adjusted. Besides this they are exempted from the cocurricular and cultural work of the institution.
- 6) The management is pledged to boost the research or otherwise establish the professional advancement of the faculty.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

For the endowment of teaching-learning process, the institution introduces various steps for the evaluation of teachers by the students and external peers:-

- The external experts visit the institution at different college occasions and provide their valuable suggestions for improving the teaching learning process.
- The quality of process is also evaluated by different determinants like pass percentage score of students in different subjects, improvement in Teachers qualification use of different teaching learning equipments, participation in faculty enrichment programmes etc.
- Suggestion and feedback collected from the students in formal and informal manner is critically analyzed to take relevant steps in future.
- The Head of different departments provides an evaluative feedback about the other members of faculty.
- Self Appraisal Reports submitted at end of each Academic Session to evaluate the performance.
- The Principal of the college has analysis of their self appraisal reports and puts her remarks on the ACRs of the Teachers. Career Advancement and award of Annual Increments are granted to teaching and non-teaching staff by College Management as per remarks of Principal in ACR's of the Staff.
- Time to time, meetings by the Advisory Council and staff members are held for the betterment of teaching process.

#### 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

To ensure that the students and the faculty members are aware of the evaluation processes, the institution takes the following measures:-

- The college prospectus contains details regarding examination rules, house tests & internal assessment criteria. All this makes the evaluation process transparent to the students.
- After House Exams answer sheets are shown to the students, and on the basis of that internal assessment is prepared. Results are sent to the parents by post.
- The faculty clearly explains the evaluation and assessment process in the weekly morning Assembly held on every Monday.
- The Examination Committee General Office and Library gives proper information regarding university reforms; guidelines and instructions which are timely update during the academic session.
- Guidance and clarification regarding evaluation process is provided in the class room by the teachers.

- The new faculty members are guided by their heads and other senior faculty members.
- Class tests, assignments, group discussion and interaction session in the class also aware the students with the evaluation process
- Parent-Teacher-Principal meets are heldin an informal manner to get their feedback and suggestions.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

Major evaluation reforms by the University:-

- Semester System has been introduced in the first year of under graduate classes, Post Graduate Classes.
- The University has successfully implemented the method of table marking to ensure fair evaluation.
- The system of external superintendents and external invigilation staff is another step towards fair conducting of examination.
- If the students are not satisfied with their University results, there is a provision for applying for re-evaluation by the University and students having grievances related to Roll no. not received, any other enquiry related with re-evaluation, result, correction informed or any other examination related issue can report to examination grievances monitoring system (EGMS) launched by University in 2013.
- External examiners are appointed for practical subjects like computer, physical education, Music, Fine Arts Home Science and Fashion Designing and External examinations are appointed for conducting the Viva in commerce. If any candidate who due to some medical ground, court case, or late admission, misses the practical examination should report within ten days from the date of termination of the practical examination. Practical will be conducted with a fee of Rs. 500/- per subject.
- The assessment guidelines were made more precise in the year 2010, the college has to prepare and submit and internal assessment awards and practical examination awards of UG Courses on CDs as per approved format for which the software is provided by the university.
- The university has started computerization of Registration cum-roll number Process in the year 2004-05 for regular students of the college. In this process PUPIN CARD issued to the candidates has to be kept with him as long as he is attached with the university.
- In the year 2009, the university introduced Answer Books with OMR Front Covers and a change in the examination timings. The answer books are distributed at 9.00 /2.00 P.M and 15 minutes time is given in the beginning of each session for the filling of OMR sheet under the instruction and supervision of invigilators. Red stamp pads are used for stamping the answer books which have started from April 2013 onwards.
- The Registration Return CD along with detailed instruction for using the student's registration software is provided to all affiliated colleges in the term of CD-Instruction package.

- As per the new evaluation reforms of university which were introduced in 2008-09, in order to incorporate an element of continuous assessment of students, an internal assessment equal to 10% of the total marks in theory/practical in all subjects/ paper of the UG courses and 20% in case of PG courses has been introduced.
- The university has started awarding computerized degree containing passport size photograph of the candidate in the year 2010.

### **Evaluation reforms by the Institution:**

- Answer books of the house test are shown to the students after evaluation. The question paper is discussed in detail in the class and their parents are also informed about their performance in House Exams and attendance of Lecture Records after every term.
- The teachers point out the mistakes to the students and encourage them to perform better in future.
- The brilliant students are motivated to bag University positions and remedial classes are held for the weak students.
- Assignments given to the students from time to time are considered for internal assessment.
- For students in sports or other activities, special tests are conducted.
- The HODs guide the junior staff members on the evaluation process.

## 2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

- A well planned Academic Calendar is prepared including the details of probable dates of House Exams, submitting of Lecture Statements and submitting of Workload by Staff etc. (Details of Academic Calendar of Session 2014-15 given as Annexure A11(i) to A11(iv)).
- The college has framed an Examination Committee to ensure the effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own. Besides this, the college Discipline Committee, the IQAC Committee & the Advisory Committee play an important role to reinforce theproper implementation of evaluation reforms. Training has been given to the non-teaching staff to handle software provided by the University for Registration of students, filling of on-line forms, entering data regarding internal assessment and practical marks etc.
- The examination committeekeenly monitors all components of evaluation process that is advance seating preparation as per date sheet, examination duty charts, conduct of special test, detainee lists and its secret evaluation, arrangements for conduct of annual and supplementary university examination.
- All teaching and non-teaching staff and students are made well aware about changes/reforms made by University through College Prospectus, Notices displayed on Notice Boards and office circular displayed time to time. College Principal and the Head of the Department make sure that the guidelines issued by the university are followed for internal assessment
- All the staff members of General Office have been trained with

- Computerized Networking of the Office and all have been provided with Broad Band Internet Connectivity
- The parents whose wards do not qualify the University conditions are informed by post.
- 2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

The following formative and summative assessment approaches are adapted to measure student achievements at curricular and co-curricular levels.

**Formative evaluation approaches**:- Special tests are given to the weak students, in order to evaluate their weak areas. On the basis of house tests, class tests & response in the class room, the advanced learners are recognized and extra attention is paid in order to motivate them for further achievements. The result of both the house tests is mailed to the students.

**Summative evaluation/approaches:-**University examinations are conducted. Internal assessment is calculated on the performance of the students on the basis of their marks in the House tests Class and as well as on the basis of their attendance and regularity.

**Formative evaluation approaches:**-Talent hunt is organized to pick up different talents of the students. Auditions are held for students interested in dramatics, dance, debate, elocution etc. The selected students are further trained to excel in their respective fields.

**Summative evaluation/approaches:-**The trained students are motivated to participate in Inter College Competitions & Youth Festivals.

**Extra-Curricular level:-**Sports trials are conducted to select students for different sports and athletic.Students shortlisted in various sports, athletics events are given extensive coaching so that they can bring laurels to their Alma-mater.

**Summative evaluation approaches:-**Trained students are encouraged to participate in competitions at University, inter-university and national level.

A few examples which have positively impacted the system are:-

It is a matter of great pride that our student Alisha has stood first in the B.A I examination conducted by Panjab University, Chandigarh in the session 2013-2014. As many as 132 students have scored 70% and above in 2013-2014.588 students passed the examination in the first division. The tradition of showing excellent results has been the hall mark of our institution since its very inception.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.)

It is one of our prime endeavors to ensure rigor and transparency in the internal assessment. There is a set criterion for making the assessment. Weight age is given to the marks obtained by the students in the house tests, Class test timely completion of assignments and attendance in the class, as laid down by the University.

To maintain transparency, the answer sheets of house exams are shown to the students and the attendance of lectures and marks obtained in house exams are

conveyed through letters to the parents after each of them. Every month the documents showing the attendance of lectures are shown to the students and even got signed from them.

2.5.6 What are the graduate attributes specified by the college/affiliating university? How does the college ensure that attainment of these by the students?

• The graduate attributes are well defined in the mission statements of our college. (Details given in 1.1.1)

### 2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

- At the college level, answer sheets of the house examinations are marked properly, mistakes and deficiencies are individually explained by the teachers to the students so that they are able to understand their shortcomings. The question paper is thoroughly discussed. The total is also checked by the students and unmarked question, if any, is marked. It is ensured that the students feel satisfied with the evaluation.
- The university has launched Examination Grievances Monitoring System (EGMS) in 2013 to receive and address examination related grievances of the students like, Roll No. not received, DMC/ degree certificate not received, result related inquiring revaluation result inquiry, fee related inquiring, correction in form, wrong subject, problem in examination form, submission of documents and any other examination related issue.
- At the university level there is a provision for re-evaluation where the answer book is checked by two examiners. Total is checked once again by the special staff on duty for this purpose.

### 2.6 Student performance and Learning Outcomes

### 2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If, yes" give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

Yes, the College has clearly stated learning objectives and outcomes imparting Physical, Mental and Spiritual training to our students so that they acquire enough strength to cope with the Challenges of Life. The College Motto 'Satyam Shivam Sundaram' is adopted to serve as an inspiration to staff and students to inculcate our Vision 'Awakened Women – Awakened Nation' and our Mission 'Value-Based Job-Oriented Education' and following mission statements though celebrations of Academic and Co-Academic activities and Days of National and International importance. Besides this the Learning outcomes related to subject knowledge of the Programmes /subjects are stated in the Syllabus or college Website. Hard Copies of the Syllabi are also made available in the College Library. These Syllabi are also handed over to staff and students of the College in the form of Printed schedule of work.

Through all these methods, learning outcomes of the College are clearly stated to staff and students. They are taught the doctrine to strive and seek which is the best in thought, work and deed.

**Our Mission:** The mission statements of the college make the students and the staff aware of the learning outcomes. The details of mission statement have been cited in 1.1.1.

The college aims at providing a value-based education to the students. It is clearly stated in the annual Prospectus of the College, which serves as a guideline for the students and the teachers. The teachers go through the syllabus to be taught by them. Schedule of work is prepared by the teachers both for annual and semester system classes. The details are already mentioned in 1.1.2.

The faculty has an interaction with the University faculty for updating its knowledge.

The mission of the College is to offer Job oriented Education. Due importance is given to the curricular as well as co-curricular activities. The institution aims at hammering national, moral, social values in the students, awareness regarding social issues, universal themes, brother hood, fraternity etc.

2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? Provide an analysis of the students' results/achievements (Programme/course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.

- The college is run by highly experienced and dedicated staffwho introduce innovative techniques in order to uplift the performance of the students in curricular as well as co-curricular fields.
- Departmental meetings and House Examinations are conducted to evaluate the performance of the studnets.
- Personalized attention is given to cope up with the short comings of the students.
- Official letters are dispatched to the parents regarding the result of their wards.
- In case the student remains absent for the period more than 7 days the concerned teacher is required to give information to Dean Academics and intimation is sent to the parents.
- There is a tutorial system in the college. It provides a healthy platform to the teachers and the taught to interact freely. Its focus is again on improving the quality of education being given in the college.
- Parent Teacher meets are held, in which the achievements of the students are discussed.

The college has been showing excellent results in university exams since its inception in 1973. The excellent annual results of past session in university examination kept along the glorious tradition as a general past percentage of most of PG and UG classes was 100% or the past percentage of the college was much higher than university pass percentage. Every year a number of students of the college make their alma mater proud by getting first division.

In session 2013-14 Alisha got Ist position in university in B.A. I.




Graphical representation of No. of Students who secured University Positions during Post Accreditation Period is given below:-

## 2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

The college adopts the following teaching learning and assessment strategies: To enhance the teaching learning process the requirements such as new faculty books, teaching learning equipments, laboratory equipments, software and other infrastructure are timely identified and fulfilled.

• The flexibility is maintained to drive out maximum value from the courses. The personal attention and guidance of the faculty members to the students makes teaching learning more fruitful..

- Class tests, written assignments, oral tests, group discussions form an important part of the teaching strategy.
- Special counseling for slow learners by the respective subject teachers is provided.
- The brilliant students are recognized and motivated to make use of the reference material available in the library.
- OHPs (over head Projectors Slides), Power Point Presentations, Digital Visualizes, Charts, models, interactive boards and projectors are used by faculty members and students to intensity the teaching learning process.
- Various activities like paper presentation, poster making, quizzes, debates, elocution, special day celebrations etc are organized during session endowment of the students learning experiences.

#### **Assessment Strategies:**

- The college follows the rules and regulations of Panjab University regarding assessment. However, certain assessment strategies are adopted by the college to create an environment which encourages learning in an honest and fair manner.
- Special tests are arranged for the students who are not able to take the terminal examinations due to medical reasons/clash in tournament dates of sports/youth festival etc.
- In order to acquaint the parents with the progress of their wards, the result of the house tests and any other relevant information regarding Teaching-Learning and Evaluation which the college would like to include is intimated to the parents.
- A.S. College for Women, Khanna caters to the needs of students hailing from rural and semi-urban areas. The aim is to develop a global outlook among the learners. Hence every possible effort is made to expose them to the latest learning methods. This is done by arranging specialized lectures by the college faculty or by guest speakers. Examinations results are sent by post at their residential addresses and parent teacher meeting is organized with a view to improve the result of the students.
- 2.6.4 What are the measures / initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

To enhance the social and economic relevance of the courses offered, the institution takes the following measures:

- Personality development and soft skill development and career guidance and counseling workshops are conducted regularly in the college.
- Conferences/ seminars/ Extension Lecturer/ Workshops organized by different departments help our faculty and students to have interaction with the experts and scholars from various fields.
- For overall development of personality of the students, many extension activities like NCC, NSS are undertaken. It enriches the personality and develops socio-economic awareness.
- The IQAC motorboats the students for higher studies and research.
- The college laboratories and libraries help the students inculcate

innovation by allowing them to explore and experiment innovatively.

The Principal conducts a meeting with the departmental heads after the house examination to analyze the performance of the students. Special attention is given to the students who lag behind in their corresponding course subjects. Weak students are identified and strategies in the form of remedial classes are devised. To overcome the barriers of learning, special counseling sessions, question banks, timely steps to remove the grievances of students and regular motivation for improvement are undertaken. The above average students are provided special coaching to steer them towards the category of special achievers.

The institution provides two vocational subjects like Fashion Designing, and Functional English in B.A, Add-on-course of communicative English, B.SC in Fashion Designing, B.Com with Computer Based Accounting and B.A. with English Hons. and B.Com. with Hons. These courses are introduced to enhance skill development and increase employability among girl students. Besides these, the institution is running 06 crash courses in non-formal mode.

## 2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyse data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

A well defined mechanism is adopted by the institution to collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes:-

- Marks of the students in both the House examinations and class tests are recorded in the office at proper proforma.
- College pass percentage is compared with University pass percentage.
- Participation of students in class discussion
- Participation of students in extra-curricular activities

Principal of the College conducts meetings with the Heads of Departments after the House exams to scrutinize the student's performance. After indentifying the students, weak in the subjects of English, Economics and Mathematics, Remedial classes are arranged in the college. To overcome the barriers of learning, special counseling sessions, question banks, and regular motivation for improvement are undertaken. Above average students of the college are also provided with special coaching to guide those to bag merit positions. In addition to this, the college has formed IQAC to collect and analyze data on student learning outcomes.

### 2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes

The college scrutinizes the achievements of learning outcomes through IQAC and Academic council which ensure the achievement of learning outcomes by:-

- Identify slow and advanced learners and arrangement of Remedial Classes for them
- Conducting house tests and class tests
- Extension lectures are arranged.
- Informal parent-teacher meets are arranged.
- Class discussions are endorsed so that students can be morally strengthened.

#### 3.1 Promotion of Research

The staff is encouraged to cultivate research culture and take up minor and major research projects and pursue M.Phil.andPh.D. It helps to motivate the staff and get access to variousestablished National and International Journals. The members of the Research Promotion Cell are Dr. Meenu Sharma (Principal), Dr. Karuna Arora, Dr. Rajni Chhabra, Dr. Naina Sharma, Dr. Punardeep Singh Aujla andMs. Rashmi Tarika.

The Committee plans the holding of national seminars/conferences.

Recommendations of the Research Committee are as following:

- To acknowledge the faculty regarding the financial aid that they can pursue for research
- To encourage the staff members to present papers in National-International Conferences and get their papers published in reputed journals

#### Impact of Encouragement

During last 4 years, as many as 5 faculty members have obtained the coveted Ph.D degree, 3 members have registered for doctoral programme and 1has completed M.Phil, 2 have registered for M.Phil from reputed universities of Punjab. Faculty members have also excelled in the publication works. During last 4 years and till date, 4 Books and 08 Chapters in Books have got published by them.

40 Research papers/Articles/Poems have been published in reputed Inter National/ National Journals with ISBN No. and in newspapers.

Teachers actively participate in seminars, conferences and also present papers. 37 Research papers have been presented at various seminars & conferences.

PG department of Mathematics organized 3-Days'National Conference and 23 faculty members attended National/International Seminars/Conferences and

workshops in October 2013 on the topic "Recent Trends in Algebra and Analysis' in which 45 papers of high quality were presented by scholarly academicians from all over India.

- INFLIBNET N-LIST Programme has been made available to access 6000+e-Journals (back volume for 10 years and 97,000+e-books). This facility is being widely used by the faculty.
- In 2013-2014, The Institution applied for the grant from UGC, New Delhi for setting up Swami Vivekanand Studies Centre and Dr.Ambedkar Studies Centre under the Scheme 'Epoch Making Social Thinkers of India' in College Campus and has got sanctioned the Financial assistance of Rs.1,50,000 for Swami Vivekanand Studies Centre and Rs.1,50,000 for Dr. Ambedkar Studies Centre.

### 3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects?

The provision for the part time Ph.D. programmes has been designed by the liberal Management and the Principal of the college. Following efforts have been made to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research in the college.

The college facilitates the faculty with research facilities like Research Journals, INFLIBNET facility and separate computers in computer labs.

All invitations by the colleges regarding the conduct of conferences and seminars are circulated among the staff.

- The institution provides opportunities to the faculty for attending conferences in the form of duty leave, and thus encourages and promotes research culture.
- Faculty are given due recognition for research. Their achievements are published in 'Annual Report' of the college and Ph.D. degree awardees are honored in college Convocation.
- Conducts training programmes and extension lectures, interface meetings with eminent intellectuals.
- Faculty members who have opted for research programmes are facilitated by the college regarding the time table so that they can smoothly run their research activities.
- Overhead charges sanctioned by funding agencies like Department of Science and Technology, UGC, New Delhi and Panjab University, Chandigarhhave been utilized for enhancing the infrastructural facilities, supply of continuous electricity and water usage for research.

### 3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

The institution makes regular and sincere efforts in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students. Some of the efforts made are as follows:

- The Teachers share their own specific research interests with the students in order to kindle in them a research aptitude for the future.
- The library staff and the teachers help the students to work out on the research articles and books that may inspire them for research. The students are facilitated in their projects by providing books, journals,

- Eminent personalities from established institutions are cordially invited for informative session on latest development in their respective fields.

The institution received grants from Punjab University Chandigarh and Department of Science & Technology, New Delhi for organizing National Conference in Oct. 2013. In addition to the grants the over expenditure is borne by the institution itself. In 2013-14, the college got sanctioned the grants from UGC for setting up Dr. Ambedkar Studies Centre and Swami Vivekananda Studies Centre. Detail has already been given in 3.1.2.

3.2.2 Is there a provision in the institution to provide seed money to the faculty for research? If so, specify the amount disbursed and the percentage of the faculty that has availed the facility in the last four years?

The college doesn't have any provision for seed money to be availed by the faculty for research, but a huge amount of money is spent on purchasing latest books related to research and renewal of journals and periodicals. During last 4 years Rs. 1,70,640/- was spent on renewal of journals and periodicals. INFLIBNET facility was provided to staff in 2013-14 to widen the research aptitude of the staff & students and Rs. 5,000/- was spent on providing this facility.

According to the syllabi of the affiliating University, any kind of research project/work is not included at undergraduate and post graduate level, so there are no provisions to support student Research projects at UG levels and PG level. But, still the institution provides for research work in following way.

- The college campus and hostel both are laced with internet facility. INFLIBNET facility is available in the library.
- Provision of Seminar hall/Conference Hall for Power Point Presentation
- Well furnished Computer Labs
- Provision of reprographic facility

#### 3.3 Research Facilities

### 3.3.1 What are the research facilities available to the students and research scholars within the campus?

The conventional undergraduate students are not required to undertake any research as according to the Panjab University Curriculum it is not a part of their course. But the institution provides the following facilities to inculcate in them the inclination toward research in future.

- Computer Labs with Internet facility
- Fashion Designing Lab with TUCA CAD software.
- Fine Arts lab.
- English Language Lab.
- The college has air conditioned, fully furnished and well equipped library with Reading Room & Reference Sectionwith 25990 books on all subjects till date and 787 Reference Books. It subscribes to 15 Newspapers, 75 Periodicals/Journals along with internet facility in the form of INFLIBNET. The college also provides Book Bank facility. In last four years, as many as 1781 students of the college got benefited from the Library Reader's Club facility and Book Bank Facility. Book Bank facility is specially meant for helping the needy and meritorious students.

3.3.2 What are the institutional strategies for planning, upgrading and creating infrastructural facilities to meet the needs of researchers especially in the new and emerging areas of research?

Though our college, being Post graduate institution is in budding stage, still the college has set up and upgraded advanced Computer labs, Library and English labs at regular intervals. It is all done to enlarge the creative vision and broaden the intellectual horizon of the students.

- The institution has a provision of the research committee for enhancing the research culture.
- Financial resources are well maintained for organizing seminars and conferences.
- The institution gears up the facility to go for the grants under various schemes both from UGC and the affiliating University.
- The UGC grants have been availed for the procurement of the infrastructure.
- Books and Journals are also bought responding to the demand of teachers and students.

## 3.3.3 Has the institution received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facilities? If 'yes' what are the instruments/facilities created during the last four years.

- Our institution has received a grant of Rs. 75,000/- from Department of Science of Technology New Delhi and Rs. 31,000/- from Panjab University Chandigarh to organized 3- Days National Conference by the Post Graduate Department of Mathematics.

As such, there are no research facilities outside the campus. But the faculty members visit various libraries on their own to carry out their research work. Students also pay visits outside the college.In the session 2011-2012 the students of B.Sc IIFashion Designing tied up with various industries as trainees. This includes the names of Rose MarieKnitwears Pvt.Ltd. Ludhiana, Malwa Industries Ltd. Machiwara, Shri. Ganesh Dresses, Ludhiana, Adya Brothers Ludhiana.

- **Library:** The College has air conditioned, fully furnished and well equipped library with Reading Room & Reference Section. Details are given in 2.3.9
- Conference Hall: The institution owns a well-established seminar hall with a seating capacity of about 150 people. It has been used to organize conferences and seminars etc. Use of interactive board with interactive LCD Projector is beneficial in the smooth conduct of conferences.

- English Language Lab: The language lab laced with Modern Audio-Video aids has been set up in the college.
- Computer Labs: The faculty members have been facilitated with the computer lab decorated with wi-fi facility, Various Softwares like MS Office XP, 2003, Turbo C++, coral-Draw, Linux, Red Hat 7.1, Oracle-9i, Oracle 11G, Tally.EXPR0 has been installed for the research purpose.

#### 3.4 Research Publications and Awards

### 3.4.1 Highlight the major research achievements of the staff and students contributing to community development.

Research by Dr. Sushma Singla, Associate Professor in Home Science, on the topic 'Role of Women in Family Finance Management in Urban Punjab' highlights the contribution of Women in family as well as in society. The research brings into light how Middle Income Group category women are economically contributing more than their higher income and lower income group category counterparts. This study brings forth the changing scenario regarding the position of women in society and helps to furnish a healthier psychological frame work regarding a girl child.

The study conducted by Dr. Punardeep Singh Aujla has a great social relevance. India has a high percentage of illiterates and a grater number of aged widows than widowers. The reasons for these are lack of public amenities in villages, orthodox nature of rural folk, age old traditions and Customs and embittered outlook towards women in general. The study brings out the need for the socio-psychological attention to be paid to the elderly persons, especially to the elderly women in rural areas.

In order to familiarize the students with the practical facet of their respective fields, educational/industrial visits are planned by the institution. For the same purpose the students of Home Science tied up with the industries outside the college.

### 3.5.2 What is the stated policy of the institution to promote consultancy? How is the available expertise advocated and publicized?

- Basic Computer Course for the faculty members was arranged by the Computer Department of the College.
- Department of Fashion Designing provides six month crash course for the students.

- The library provides consultancy services in setting up of libraries in educational institutions. In 2010-11, the College Librarian was deputed to establish library of the newly opened A.S. Group of Institutes which is being run by the same management. Our college library is also imparting practical training in libraryship. During last four years, 05 candidates have been given practical training by our library. The next level in consultancy service is taken in through the website and social networking, sincere endeavours are made to develop an interface with the local industry.
- Teachers from various departments are invited as subject experts by different schools of the area.

### 3.5.3 How does the institution encourage the staff to utilize their expertise advocated and available facilities for consultancy services?

The college motivates the staff members to utilize their specialized knowledge through extension activities which are undertaken by different clubs and societies of the college.

The institution grants duty leave to members of the faculty whenever their services are required by other organizations and deputes them when any request is received through the institution.

- Progress of students is maintained regularly and the performance of the ward is communicated to parents through letters, phone calls & at the Parent Teacher Meeting.

The NSS Department adopts a particular village at NSS camp, organized every year, and works for the development of that particular area.
- The NCC unit of the college also comes forward and works in collaboration with the other departments and committee of the college to departments and committees of the college to carry out the extension activities. They take part in Tree plantation, Blood donation camps environment awareness programs with tremendous zeal and enthusiasm.
- The institution promotes these extension activities by extending help in the form of funds, refreshment & transport. The achievements of the teachers & students are acclaimed & highlighted in the assembly, college publications & local newspapers. Special incentives & concessions are given to outstanding performances.

#### 4.1 Physical Facilities

### 4.1.1 What is the policy of the institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

The institution has a well-defined policy for creating and enhancing the infrastructure to facilitate quality education and effective teaching-learning process.

Proposals prepared before the start of financial year are discussed in meetings with working members of Management, College Advisory Committee, Purchase Committee, Maintenance of College Building and infrastructure Committee. There is a consistent effort towards modernizing the teaching technologies involving purchase of computers, internet connection (broadband), equipments for labs. Library and other learning resources are made more easily accessible and special care is taken for the up gradation of the same.

The policy regarding the infrastructural enhancement goes through various stages while channelization. At first stage, the infrastructural requirements are determinated. These requirements are in accordance with the introduction of new subjects/courses, students' feedback and the increasing strength of the students. At second stage, the required changes are enlisted on priority basis and availability of funds. At third and final stage, the purchase and supply of the infrastructure is made on Quotation basis. The quotations are invited from different suppliers to make a comparative study. After thorough analysis the most economical and the best quality options are chosen to ensure the proper utilization of grants and funds. At the end of every academic session, there is a provision for Stock-checking. It makes sure that all the infrastructural amenities are utilized at the fullest and also maintained properly.

### **4.1.2** Detail the facilities available for Curricular and Co-curricular and Sports activities.

The college has all the required infrastructural facilities like Seminar Hall, Class Rooms and well-equipped labs. Besides this, it has separate block for Administration having well equipped and fully air conditioned General Office and Accounts Office and also fully furnished staff room for the faculty members. The college has an outdoor sports ground for sports activities and a medical room for the medical treatment of staff and students. Three well established Computer labs add to the latest infrastructural propensity of the college. There is an arrangement of enormous classrooms with proper lightening, airing and ventilation facility. Common room is built to facilitate the students. College canteen is another feather in the college cap which

makes arrangements for healthy and hygienic food. There is a hostel facility for girls students.





Figure 4.4 Layout of College- Play Ground

- Several professional and Competitive exams (JET two to three times) organized by outside agencies are held in the college
- For effective use of infrastructure, the college ground remains open for the residents of the town during morning and evening (from 5:30 a.m. to 8 a.m. and from 5:00 p.m to 9:00 p.m) for walking, for doing exercises, meditation extra. There is no entry fee and monthly fee for the use of ground.

Career Counseling and Guidance Committee and Placement Unit: Students' Counseling and Career Guidance Cell takes care of the well being, welfare and personal development of the girls. The college has an active career guidance cell. It organizes various seminar, workshop and coaching programs very frequently. The career guidance cell prepares the students for written test, interview and various career options while they are in the colleg, particularly in the final year. The cell keeps contact with them even after they have left the college and short-term courses are organized for preparing them for various tests and interviews. The placement cell works in collaboration with Career and Guidance Cell. The main aim is to inculcate a sense of responsibility among students to be placed in higher positions. The cell functions as a vital organ to bridge the gap between companies and students with a focus on employability. The main motive of this cell is to identify leading companies in various fields and to motivate and train the students for succeeding in the interviews in collaboration with the Career Guidance and Counseling Cell and various other faculties. Health Centre: Medical Room with First aid facility. Medical emergencies are met with lighting speed. For this purpose College Van is at the disposal for 24 hours.

Canteen, recreational spaces for staff and students:

Canteen/Hostel Mess: There is a well maintained and airy Canteen for the students and staff members. The college canteen committee supervise the quality of food and rates of various eatables..The proper menu of food for the hostlers is also prepared.

Facilities for staff: There is a well furnished staff room with two ACs, a water purifier, individual lockers and a hotcase.

Safe drinking water facility: The facility of water coolers with Aquaguard system and RO is available in the all buildings of the college, at every floor.

Auditorium: The college owns an Auditorium with seating capacity of 800 students latest audio-video facility Its huge stage is used as a space for rehearsals. 
The Library Advisory committee plays a vital role in the smooth functioning and development of the College Library-

## 4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

The college has a well trained and seasoned team for maintenance of the infrastructure and full-fledged team to maintain and repair the infrastructural facilities and equipment. There is a committee framed for the maintenance of college building and infrastructure comprising of seven members from teaching and Nonteaching staff. A separate committee works for the beautification of the campus.

- The college has permanent electrician, painter, plumber and carpenter on contract for repairing infrast ructure.
- The regular service of the bus is got done once in a year or on Km. basis.
- Electric equipments like Generators are serviced as per hours of scheduled run.
- During the last nine years the lawns have been relaid with grass and about 800 plants and shrubs have been planted.
- The college has the credit of having the well established stadium.
- The College areas, Class rooms and labs are cleaned up and dusting is done every day early in the morning. A Separate store room is available in the library where outdated books are stored. Private binders are hired for the maintenance of old and worn out books

## 4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/instruments?

For the proper functioning of the computers, Anti Virus software is installed and updated regularly, the batteries of UPS equipment are replaced at time to time. The urgently required technical assistance for minor repairs is available in the institution itself But the major electing equipments are serviced when required.

## 4.4.4 What are major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

The major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment are given below:

- There is deployment of an electrician for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipments.
- There is installation of voltage stabilizers and transformers for equipment to control voltage fluctuations and UPS System have been installed in Labs, General Offices, and Accountant Office etc.
- Equipments are installed at befitting and preserved places.
- There are 05 Submersible pumps that are installed to ensure the uninterrupted water supply. Water tanks are regularly cleaned to provide clean water. Keeping in view the noise pollution, the silent generator is installed by Kirloskar and the College has two generators set 25, 63,125kv for uninterrupted power supply. In addition to this Invertors/UPS facilities are provided in specific areas. Water coolers with purifiers are placed to provide fresh and clean water.

### 5.1 Student Mentoring and Support

Annual Report carries information regarding curricular and co-curricular activities of the college and College Magazine provides opportunities to the students to improve their writing skills and this helps them in developing their creativity.

### 5.1.4 What are the specific support services/facilities available for Students?

A sincere effort is made by the institution for the participation of students in various competitions- National and International, Cultural and Sports Activities various facilities are provided to them for the same.

### a) Students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections

Students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections are given:

- Fee Concession, payment of fee in easy installments
- Scholarships
- Reservation in admission as per Central Government/University norms
- Special/Remedial Classes are arranged for SC/ST, OBC students.
- Specimen copies of text books are given to needy students.

### b) Students with physical disabilities

Their classes are arranged only on the ground floor. All other students will assemble in that room so that they need not move from one place to another place. Even during university exams their seats are arranged at the ground floor. Special Stipends are given to handicapped students by the College as well as Punjab Govt. Washrooms for these students are available at the ground floor. Differently abled students are always encouraged on humanitarian grounds to make them feel a part of the group.

#### c) Overseas students

Well-furnished special Air-conditioned rooms are provided in the hostel. The students who wish to go in foreign country and need certificate the college provides them required certificates without any delay. Courses are taught in English medium.

## d) Students participation in various competitions-National and International

Student who participate in various competitions are provided with:

- Special training by Experts/Coaches/Trainers is arranged for students for their better training and to prepare them for competitions.
- Refreshment is given to students participating in Youth Festival and other competitions.
- Library facility-various journals and magazines are issued to these students on priority basis.
- Computer with net facility is available.
- Bus facility is given to the participants.
- Rent for dresses is borne by the College.

Special Classes are arranged for the participants so that they can clear University Condition

### e) Sports

- Special coaches are arranged for sport students for their better training and to prepare them for competitions.
- The students are provided with free sport kit and conveyance for participating in various competitions.
- Financial assistance is given to sports students.

### f) Medical assistance to students, Health Center, Health Insurance etc.

- Medical room is available for the students having first aid facilities.
- College Bus facility is available for 24 hours for hostlers to take the students to hospital during emergency.

### g) organizing coaching classes for competitive exams

- As such there is no formal mechanism for coaching for competitive examination but a NET-based test is conducted for PG students.
- Guidance is provided by the faculty members regarding Competitive Examaniationinformally.
- Latest books are made available in the library on various competitiveness examinations like B.Ed, UGC-NET, Bank Recruitment (P.O and Clerk), Insurance, Railways, Civil Supply, Taxation, Civil Services Exams etc.
- Information regarding the details of competitive examination is displayed on notice board by Career counselling and Guidance Cell of the college

### h) Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy etc.)

- Add on courses like Communicative English and Computer Based Accounting etc. are offered. In addition to this 06 Crash Courses are being run by the College
- Literary Society of the college provides platform to the students for development of communicative skills likeelocution, debates, poetry writing, drama, music, dance etc.
- Personality development workshops are organized for the students.
- B.Sc Fashion Designing, BCA full subjects are offered to the students.B.Com has one compulsory paper 'Entrepreneurship and small scale business' which helps the students in developing their entrepreneurial skills.

### i) Support for "slow learners"

- Special assignment and test are given

## Exposureof students to other institutions of higher learning / corporate / business houses etc.

Industrial visits and educational trips are arranged to expose the students to the business environment and to enhance the knowledge of the students. During session 2013-2014, various industrial visits were organized by Home Science Department, Fashion Designing Department and Commerce Department. PG students are accompanied by Staff to participate in National/International Seminars/Conferences and Lectures held at neighboring institutions for their exposure. In October 2013, National Conference was organized by the

Institution and all the Students of Maths Department and many Students from other Departments attended the Conference for 3 days.

### Publication of student' magazine

To inculcate the writing skills amongst the students, the college annually publishes its college magazine "AVASTHA". The students of the college contribute their articles to the magazine very enthusiastically. The college magazine is printed under the supervision of the college Editorial Board. All the major sections of the magazine have staff as well as student editors. The staff helps the students to improve their creative skills.

- Industrial Visit by Fashion Designing Department to Fashion House 'SEO Collection' at Jagroan.
- Industrial Visit by Commerce Department to 'Markfed' Jalandhar.

**Impact**: Skill enhancement opportunities provided by the institution instill professionalism among the students and equip the students with the potential to open their own business. Our students have been employed in public and private sectors. Our students have ventured out to setup their boutiques etc.

• In the beginning of the Session a well planned Co-Academic Calendar is prepared by the Dean Co-Academic in consultation with Principal and Dean Academic and Dean Sports.

- Students are asked to fill the column in Admission Forms regarding their interest/achievement in Co-Curricular activities in Sports.
- Minor games are organized by the Head, Physical Education Department to select the students for sports.
- Various Clubs and subjects Societieshave been formed to encourage the
  participation of students in extra-curricular and co-curricular activities of
  the college. 'Talent Search', 'Teej Festival' and Talent Hunt are organized
  to select the students for different items of Youth Festival. Students are
  also groomed for participation in cultural activities at Inter College, Zonal
  and Inter Zonal Youth Festival in different activities.
- Adequate funds are allocated to various activities and the talented performers are polished by expert trainers and accompanists so that they bring laurels to the institution.

Institution provides support to participants in the following manner:-

- House Tests are rescheduled in case the exam date clashes with competitions and tournaments conducted at national, state and university level. They are exempted from House Examinations and are allowed to appear in Special Tests to determine their eligibility for Final Examination.
- Regular refreshment special diet under supervision of canteen committee dresses, sports kit, bus facility is provided to the sports students, Various scholarships are provided to the deserving students. Their achievements are highlighted in the college magazine, prospectus at College Website. They are honored at annual Sports Meet and Prize Distribution Functions.
- 5.1.7 Enumerating on the support and guidance provided to the students in preparing for the competitive exams, give details on the number of students appeared and qualified in various competitive exams such as UGC-CSIR-NET, UGC-NET, SLET, ATE/ CAT/ GRE/ TOFLE/ GMAT/ Central/State services, Defense, Civil Services, etc.

As such there is no formal mechanism for coaching for competitive examination but a NET-based test is conducted for PG students. Guidance is provided by the faculty members regarding Competitive Examination Informally. Latest books are made available in the library and INFLIBNET facility is available in the library for staff and studentson various competitiveness examinations like B.Ed, UGC-NET, Bank Recruitment (P.O and Clerk), Insurance, Railways, Civil Supply, Taxation, Civil Services Examination etc. Information regarding the details of competitive examination is displayed on notice board by Career counselling and Guidance Cell of the college. College does not have any authorized data regarding number of students appearing and qualifying competitive exams. Every year a Quiz team is prepared for participation in Youth Festival.

- Various interactive sessions with professionals are organized to equip the students with the information regarding interviews and group discussions.
- NCC unit of the college helps the students appearing in 'B' and 'C' certificate exams, which open job opportunities in Defense, Punjab Police and Military hospitals.

## 5.1.8 What type of counseling services are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho-social etc.)

The institution is committed to provide a supportive and conductive environment to its girl student so that they feel free to discuss their problems with staff and Head of the Institution. The college provides various types of counselling services to the students so that they have a positive and wholesome campus experience.

**Academic counselling:** The admission committee imparts academic counselling at the time of entry into the college regarding the choice of stream and subject combinations.

**Personal counselling:** In the tutorial group teacher attend student personally and try to solve their problem.

Career counselling: Career Guidance and Counseling Cell aims at providing the studentsthe information and guidance about various career options. Career counselling begins right at the time of admission through the admission committee. The teachers guide and direct the students regarding the choice of stream/subjects. Seminars, lectures and presentations are other ways of disseminating information among the students and counsel them regarding career options.

**Psycho-social counselling:**On the personal level also, the teachers counsel and try to solve the problems of the students.

5.1.10 Does the institution have a student grievance Redressal cell? If yes, list (if any) the grievances reported and redressed during the last four years.

Yes, the institution has a Students Grievance Redressal Committee and Gender Sensitization Committee against Sexual Harassment. The cell for students functions on the basis of the suggestion / complaints received through the suggestions/ complaint box placed in the campus. This box is opened periodically. The Principal personally takes feedback from the students regarding the syllabus covered, teaching techniques of various teachers and tries to solve their problem if any, whenever required. 26 CCTV cameras are installed at important places to monitor the College activities.

The problems of the students in the Hostel regarding Mess, drinking facility or cleanliness are personally handled by the Principal of the Institution. For the smooth conduct of the hostel, a young active and an affectionate Hostel Warden is appointed who provides guidance and counselling to the students and addresses their grievances. Grievances addressed in the last four years are as following:-

- Prize-winning students were given text book along with general books.
- Problem of students regarding water facility at 2<sup>nd</sup> floor was immediately solved.
- Time-Table of Post-Graduate students was rescheduled and were given a compact time-table, so that they can get sufficient time for self-study at home.
- Problems of students regarding the teaching method of faculty members were given patient hearing and the teacher was consulted and the problem addressed.
- Issue of hygienic food in mess for hostlers was solved by the Institution.

## 5.1.11 What are the institutional provisions for resolving issues pertaining to sexual harassment

Ours is a women institution, therefore we do not face this kind of a problem in the college. 26 CCTV cameras have been installed at strategic points. Students who are members of Central Association are assigned discipline duties in their free lecture for the whole session.

Ragging is banned in the college. Anti-Ragging activity is governed by senior staff members of the college. Because of the vigilant staff members no instance of ragging has ever been reported in the college. Rather seniors arrange Fresher's party for the new comers.

Since its inception in 1973, the institution is making efforts for the welfare of the students, a number of schemes are provided to the students. (Details given in 5.1.2)

## 5.1.14 Does the institution have a registered Alumni Association? If 'yes' what are its activities and major contributions for institutional, academic and infrastructure development?

Yes the institution has Alumni Association which is not formally registered. The college receives feedback from its graduates for improvement

of academics and infrastructure facilities through formal and informal interaction. A meeting of members of Alumni Association committee was held on 9-9-2014 which was attended by the convener of Alumni Association Committee, Dr. Karuna Arora and other senior faculty members. The meetings of all pass outs of all under graduate and post graduate courses during the last five years were held on 15-09-2014 (2013-2014), 16-09-2014 (2012-2013),17-09-2014 (2011-2012), 18-09-2014 (2010-2011),19-09-2014 (2009-2010) respectively. Meetings of old members of Alumni Association, toppers, Achievers of Youth Festival and Sports Achievers of all under graduate and post graduate courses during last ten years of the college was held on 20-09-2014. Every teaching and Non Teaching staff member was asked to set at least five members for Alumni Association to be enrolled before 15-09-2014 and these members were invited to attend meeting on 20-09-2014 at 12.00 p.m. in the Conference Hall. The valuable suggestions of Alumni students have been incorporated in major decisions of the institution, i.e. the introduction of P.G. Courses and vocational courses. Teej Festival 2009-10 and 2010-11 was celebrated by the Alumni Association. The association has scontributed to the beautification of the campus, donation of Gym cycle, fencing of Sports ground, Boards outside the college, books in book bank for the needy students.



5.2.3 How does the institution facilitate student progression to higher level of education and /or towards employments?

With a view to achieve the twin goals of accelerating progression to higher level of education and employment, the institution has initiated various programs from time to time. The institution has offered PG Programmes in Hindi in 2003-04 and in Economics 2004-05, and in Mathematics and Sociology since 2012-13. The institution gives first preference to old UG students for admission to PG classes and gives the fee concession and provides the employment for our students through Career Counselling and Guidance Cell. Brilliant students are recruited at the institution.

# 5.2.4 Enumerate the special support provided to students who are at risk of failure and drop out?

- A well chalked out strategy is adopted in teaching learning process. The
  institution has highly qualified and experienced teaching faculty.
  Unitization of syllabus is distributed to all the teachers as well as to
  students so that well defined teaching plan can be ensured.
- Despite these honest efforts, if some students are identified as slow learners or are non serious in studies by nature and are at risk of failure, special coaching classes are arranged for them and their parents are informed about their results. Report cards are sent to their parents after 1<sup>st</sup> house test and 2<sup>nd</sup> house test. Counseling is given to the students who are likely to drop out.
- Special concessions, scholarships and specimen copies of course books are given to needy students. Drop outs due to financial problem are provided libraral financial aid or are allowed to pay their fee in easy installments.
- Change of subject facility is given to the students, but that is allowed for a limited time.

• If a student does not attend the college continuously for seven days, then the information is given to the office and the student is telephonically contacted by the concerned teacher. Parents are persuaded to complete the degrees of their children.

### **5.3** Student Participation and Activities

5.3.1 List the range of sports, games, cultural and other extracurricular activities available to students. Provide details of participation and program calendar.

For the all-round development of the students, alongwith academic achievements, sports, games, cultural and other extracurricular activities are properly planned and implemented. The institution through its Dramatic Society, Cultural and heritage society, the sports wing, NCC & NSS Units makes it available to the students. The following range of activities are available to the students:-

#### For extracurricular activities

**Sports:-**The college has well maintained playground for outdoor games andindoor games. The college organizes annual sports meet in which the promising sports students of the college are honored. Students participate in Inter College Competition held at Panjab University, Chandigarh.

**Outdoor and Indoor games:** The college has well maintained playground offering facilities for the following games:-

- (1)**Indoor games:-** The college has well established sports room with the following equipments: Table Tennis, Weight Lifting, Yoga, Badminton, Wrestling, Boxing, Chess, Judo & Tai Kamando
- (2) **Outdoor games:-** Kho-Kho, Kabaddi, 200 mts Track, Shot put, Discus throw, Long jump, javelin throw, high Jump, long races & short races.

**NSS:** - National Service Scheme is adopted by the college to instill the virtues of selfless service, amity and integrity amongst the students. Day and Night camps are arranged in the college.

One day camps are also arranged from time to time. We take pride in the extension activities carried out by our volunteers under NSS. A number of programmes are initiated such as literacy drive, lecture on Health, Hygiene, Yoga awareness, career guidance, Eye check up Camp, Tree Plantation, Traffic Rules awareness, Blood Donation Camp. Beside this NSS department along with social Sciences Department celebrate Independence Day, Republic Day and Sadbhavana Divas in the college.

NCC: - An NCC Unit of 53 girl cadets under 4 Punjab Girls BN NCC, Patiala, exists in the college since 2005. The aim of NCC is to impart field training to the cadets, exposethem to team work, inculcate spirit of the adventure, endurance, and instill in them the value of discipline, integrity, team spirit and dignity of labour. The students are motivated at the beginning of every academic year to enroll themselves for NCC. Students attend various Annual Training Camps and also the camps for the training of Republic Day Parade going to be held on Republic Day at New Delhi. NCC Cadets also participate in March Past and National Anthem on Independence Day and Republic Day which is celebrated by Sub-Division Khanna. The cadets are groomed under the guidance of a staff member incharge of NCC. They actively participate in

various functions of the college. Chief Guests are escorted by the NCC, Cadets, very efficiently at the major college functions.

Co-curricular activities:-To instill the rich tradition and heritage of India, the college promotes various cultural activities. For this, the college has an auditorium (echo proof) and one Conference hall for organizing various cultural programmes throughout the year. Moreover, the Department of Music has the latest music instruments which are used by the students to polish their talent in the latest music. Panjab University organizes inter college competitions in 46 items namely theatre, music, dance, literary, fine arts, quiz and heritage items.

The college provides facility to groom the students by participating in Panjab university Zonal/ Inter –Zonal Level Youth Festival and a wide range of Intracollege and Inter-college cultural and co-curricular activities like Folk Orchestra, Debate, Elocution, Declamation, Music (vocal and instrumental), solo-Dance, group dance, Drama, Creative Writing, Quiz, Skit, Mime, Histrionics and Mimicry, Fine Arts items, Heritage items, Giddha, Group Dance, Skit, Mime, histrionics, Debate, elocution, Creative Writing, Poetry recitation, quiz, Group Bhajan, Group Song, Folk Song, Ladies Traditional Songs, Ghazal, Poster Making, Clay Modeling, Cartooning, Still Life, Landscape and Heritage items like Vaar, Kavishri singing, Luddi, Kinitting, dasuti, Pakhi making and Mehndi Designing etc. Every year students of the college participate in these activities with a lot of zeal and bag a number of prizes.

### **Departmental Activities:**

A well-defined schedule is prepared by the Dean Co-academics in consultation with the Principal regarding the co-curricular, extracurricular and cultural activities going to be performed by the various departments, clubs and societies and the co-academic calendar is strictly followed by the institution throughout the year.

A complaint/suggestion box has been placed in the college premises for the students and staff of the college. The box is opened periodically. The complaints and suggestion are discussed with the Principal by the teacher incharge of the grievance cell and efforts are made to redress the grievances. actively participate in various procedures of the IQAC. The handout of the alumni of the college cannot be underestimated. An Alumni meet is conducted annually to have a discussion about the campaigns and activities organized throughout the year.

(d) The proposals and plans of IQAC are brought into existence in accordance with the approval of management, principal and the senior staff members of the college. Several Committees like: College Advisory Committee, Library Committee, Grievance Redressal Committee& Gender sensitization Committeeagainst Sexual Harassment, Discipline Committee, Examination Committee, Canteen Committee Refreshment Committee, Time Table Committee, Prospectus Committee, Fee Concession Committee, Editorial Board of the College Magazine 'Avastha', College Web Site Committee, Purchase Committee, Sports Committee, Alumni Association, Career Guidance & Counseling, Trips and Tours Committee, Hostel Committee, NCC Lay their handout in the working of the college. Annual staff meeting is conducted to evaluate the college progress in various academics and co-academics spheres.

# 5.3.7 How does the institution network and collaborates with the Alumni and former faculty of the institution.

The institution is in touch with its old students through its Alumni Association. There are four office bearers of the association- President, Vice President, Secretary and Joint Secretary. It occasionally organizes alumni meets. The old students keep visiting the college & interact with the head of the institution & the faculty. Some socially active alumni organize cultural functions, awareness campaigns & extension activities in collaboration with the institution. ## **Objectives of the Institution:**


The following objectives are identified by the institution to accomplish its visions and missions:-

- All of our manifold academic, non-academic, extension and ISR (Institutional Social Responsibility) activities are in consonance with our future vision and are inclined towards accomplishing our Graduate Attributes.
- To motivate the students to realize their hidden talents to the best of their capacity.
- To sensitize the students towards burning contemporary issues and to handle them in a level-headed manner and to encourage the pupils to work as a team.
- To sharpen the leadership qualities in the students and to cultivate healthy leading skills among them by holding seminars and organizing extension lectures for this purpose.
- To inculcate a sense of empathy among them for the fellow humans.

# 6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The Governing Body of the institution works with progressive attitude aimed at providing value based education. The successful functioning of the institution is an outcome of the mutual efforts of the Governing Body, Principal and the faculty. The institution is marching ahead under dynamic and progressive guidance of A.S. High School Khanna Trust and Management Society, Khanna, registered under Registration of Society Act of 1860, A-25 with Certificate No.32 of 1932-33, which consists of 20 highly cultured, dedicated and enlightened persons. The trust has on its credit the successful functioning of six sister institutions also. A.S. High School Khanna Trust and Management Society, Khanna provides autonomy to each institution by conducting a democratic Governing Body in accordance with the norms of the affiliating university. Every academic session begins with Governing Body meeting conducted by the management. Besides this, the Academic and Co-Academic calendars are prepared before hand for the functioning of the academic and co-academic activities throughout the session. All sorts of issues including infrastructure, funds, channelization of grants, cases of career, the working of institution according to the directives issued by the university, UGC, State/Central government are also under the constant scrutiny of the management. In order to maintain the motto of providing quality education, the top management initiates various corrective measures frequently. There is a regular interaction between the Management, Principal, and faculty, formally and non-formally also. Being the head of the institution and ex-officio member of A.S. High School Khanna Trust and Management Society, Khanna, the College Principal acts a link between the Management, the Governing Body of the institution and the faculty members.



As the head of the institution, the Principal works whole heartedly to implement the quality policies and plans. A numbers of committees i.e. discipline committee, purchase committee, grievance redressal committee and gender sensitization committee, website committee, hostel committee, prospectus committee, central association etc. have been formulated for the implementation of the policies and plans. Dean Academics, Dean Co-Academics, Dean of Sports, Alumni Association Incharge, members of Time table committee and Examination committee are the most valuable assets of the institution, who help the administrative to plan and implement the policies. (Details of various Committeess given as Annexure A4(i) to A4(v))

The Principal often conducts meetings with the teaching and non-teaching staff for sharing policy plans and getting feedback from them. The formation of IQAC is another effort made by the institution for the mutual working of the top management, Principal and faculty in the designing and implementation of its quality policy and plans.

As quality control and check measure, the Top Management receives feedback from general public, students, Parents, eminent personalities, and other stakeholders. All the suggestions are welcomed with large heartedness for better perspectives of the institution.

#### **6.1.3** What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring:

- the policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission
- formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan

The leadership designs the future course of action in different domains, keeping in view the academic embellishment, co-curricular, sports, and underpinning of the cultural values etc. The Management functions through its executive which is an elected body. All major policy decisions regarding introduction of new courses, sanction of posts, sanction of pay scales, career advancement/Setup of teaching and non-teaching staff, development ofinfrastructure, passing of the budget etc. are taken by the Management in consultation with the Principal. The authorities gather informationabout the various aspects of the college functioning through a number of ways. The Management encourages the participation of the staff in the process of decision-making in institutional functioning. Teaching staff has its two representatives in the college's Governing Body, which is the highest decision making body. The college has different committees comprising of teachers and members of non-teaching staff which play an important role in the planning and implementation of activities in different spheres of the institution in academic, co-academic, sports, and infrastructural field. The interaction between the Principal, the stakeholders, the faculty, the nonteaching staff, the students, and the guardians is central to the policy making. The feedback collected from the stake holders is incorporated in decision making process. The interaction with the neighboring community, NGOs, retired faculty, alumni industry is also an outcome of the skilled leadership. The Principal corresponds with the Governing Body, Government of Punjab and different stake holders. This information regarding the correspondence is further reported to the Management through the Principal.

The leadership is always making tremendous efforts to reinforce the culture of excellence. The management makes liberal provisions for motivating the faculty members to upgrade their skills through orientation, refresher courses, extension lectures and seminars. In order to develop the culture of excellence, the experienced and deserving temporary teachers are considered for the recruitment. Teachers on contractual basis need not to re-appear in the interview in the coming session. Organizational changes are realized under the able guidance of the skilled leadership. The required organizational changes are scheduled by the Principal in the meeting of the Governing Body with the help of the faculty. After the approval, the changes are executed.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

There is a clear-cut and efficient mechanism to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time.

The Principal is the key figure in the institution's link with all external and internal agencies. In this capacity she monitors, implements and evaluates policies and plans. In consultation with the college Management and the college Advisory Committee, she prepares the blueprint for various academic, administrative and co-curricular activities. Time frame and excellence are the watch words for effective implementation. With respect to students, the policy of positive motivation is enforced within permissible rules. Performance of individual teachers, cells, committees, etc. is evaluated through self-appraisal activities convened by each member.

The principal presents the Annual Report at the time of Convocation and Annual Prize Distribution function through which complete information regarding the financial resources generated, expenditure on various projects scholarships provided to the students, grants received under UGC Schemes, student strength, results of the college, sports achievements, cultural activities achievements etc. is provided and the management appreciates the achievements of the college and gives the suggestions.

Regular meetings with the members of college Advisory Committee, Heads of various departments are held to ensure the implementation of the plans and the record of these meetings is properly maintained in a separate register.

In order to estimate the outcome of the Institutional policies, the valuable feedback is obtained from the stakeholders, students, parents, industry and alumni.

# 6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

Management is the supreme decision making body of the college which undertakes strategic decisions regarding academic and co-academic development of the college. The Management and the Principal ensure the growth of academic leadership in the faculty in the following manner:-

- From time to time, meetings are arranged by the President and the Secretary of the college along with other representatives of management to interact with the Principal, staff and students to discuss the ways & means which can upgrade the college. Persuading and propelling the faculty members to upgrade qualifications and be a party to various seminars and conferences.
- Providing flexibility and autonomy to the committee conveners to lead and execute growth plans along with their terms.
- Adopting a flexible and friendly outlook inviting precious views on the important issues concerning discipline, curricular, co-curricular and sports activities.
- Preparing the plan for academic and co-academic activities of the college for the whole session with the help of senior faculty members.
- Distributing the work load among the teaching faculty.
- To embolden the faculty to participate in various academic bodies.
- Introducing the new elective subjects and courses.

- Planning for UGC Grants and the budget for the coming session.
- Planning infrastructure as per the requirement.
- Inviting opinions and advice on critical issues related to students discipline, planning and academic sports and cultural activities.
- Recipients of Ph.D degrees, during the service are honoured at Annual Convocation.
- Eminent scholars are invited from reputed institutions for extension lectures.
- Getting feedback from stakeholders and incorporating the suggestions.
- The faculty decides the internal marks of the student based on the criteria given by the University. The Management doesn't interfere in the freedom of staff when a decision is taken for the students.
- The staff can recommend the best students and represents them to the management and based on that the meritorious students get some financial assistance from the College.
- The Principal advices all the Heads of the Departments to give absolute freedom during the selection of the papers to be taught by the staff while deciding the willingness and specialization so that the students are benefited.

#### 6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The college aims at imbibing leadership among the staff and students. Special care is taken for the mass participation of the staff members in all the academic and administrative planning and implementation. It grooms leadership skills in the employees at all levels of their career through a wide range of activities. This is helpful in the alignment of the personal goals of an employee with that of institutional growth. This institution works on the principle of co-operative decision making and fragmentation of authorities.

The management is always encouraging and supporting the involvement of the staff for improvement in efficiency of the institutional process. The involvement of the staff members in different growth oriented institutional activities is brought out by the Management through Principal.Staff members are appointed as a Bursar, Dean Academics, Dean Co-Academics, Dean Sports, Heads of the Departments in order to inculcate a sense of leadership.

Various committee like Building committee, Advisory committee, Discipline Committees, Examination Committee give a platform to the staff members to actively participate in the important activities.

The college promotes leadership skills in the students in the manner as given below:-

- Students are made to play important roles in various college functions, farewell parties and festival celebrations to inculcate leadership skills.
- Workshop on personality development is organized in the college.
- The students act as student editors for the various sections of the college magazine 'Avastha'.
- The Students who excel in academics, co-academics and sports are appointed as Class Representatives.

• The college has Central Association which is elected every year by elections held in the college, where every student of the college has the voting rights. The association plays an important role to bring forth the problems of the students for their solutions.

# 6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The Principal of the college pioneers the decentralized governance system. Fabrication of various bodies and councils and committees framed to assist Principal in all aspects of the institution. The Head of Departments, Incharges of various committees acquaint the Principal with the execution of institutional activities.

- The IQAC members chalk out plans and identify targets to be achieved during the academic session. It evaluates and reports on the performance of various committees, departments etc.
- The Bursar in collaboration with accounts departments monitors whether the purchase of equipments is done as per the norms of the college.
- Autonomy with reference to student admissions is given to the departments to filter the students based on the merit as per the Government norms in consultation with the convener of Admission Committee.Before releasing the interim list of students selected for admission, the Principal validates the list with regard to compliance with admission norms.
- Autonomy is given to the faculty to device various pedagogies for the Teaching-Learning process. These are then monitored during the preliminary meetings at the beginning of the session.
- Departments are given the freedom to invite academic experts for their National/State level programmes from any part of the country. The equipments and books to be purchased are decided by the respective departments, though the college allots money for these.
- Independent activities are carried out by various committiees of the college for the session.

# 6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If "yes", indicate the levels of participative management.

The college does promote the culture of participative management in a dual process. At one hand the Management actively participates, counsels and cautions the institution in all activities and on the other hand it welcomes the suggestions and options put forth by the representatives of all faculty members.

- The management invites senior faculty members to represent the faculty in the academic meetings where important resolutions are ended. Two faculty members are elected to be in the Governing Body as representatives of staff for a period of three years.
- The IQAC is constituted as per the norms of UGC. This ensures the involvement of teaching, administrative/technical staff, students, management representatives, community representatives, nominees from employer/industrialists and external experts in the decision making process.

- The heads of all the departments and the senior faculty are actively involved in the decision making process ensuring a role for each of the departments.
- The student Council i.e. Central Association President, Vice President, Secretary & Joint Secretary and Class Representative represent the whole student body. They communicate the decisions taken by the Management and the opinion of the Principal to the entire student body.
- The representatives of the student Council suggest solutions to students' problems on Campus and work on issues related to the campus. They function in close association with the class representatives and the management.

## **6.2** Strategy Development and Deployment

# 6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

In the beginning of each session, a quality policy is prepared by the Management in collaboration with the Principal and the college Advisory Committee. Following its vision and mission statements the institution aims at offering realistic education for the empowerment of women from all the strata of society by promoting academic brilliance, employability and headship with social obligations. The college is guided to empower girls by imparting them education and taking care of their general well being. Consistent steps have been taken to imbibe quality factor to its various units by the college. The tentative plans are designed by the IQAC based on the activities recommended by the various departments for the academic year. The Governing Body permits the proposed plans to be presented before the stakeholders. After this it is put before the teachers, students' representatives and administrators and then placed before the Governing Body for supervision and implementation.

# 6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

The institution opts for the extension of its development work which is already in progress. In the academic arena, the college aims at starting many post graduate courses. The prospective growth plans of the institution involves the active participation of teachers, students and members of the Management.

### Areas of perspective plan:-

- Improving result: One student of the institution bagged 1<sup>st</sup> position in B.A.I examination conducted by Panjab University Chandigarh in 2013-14. The institution endeavors to bring more such laurels.
- Adding new courses: The College plans to add post graduation courses M.A History, M.A Punjabi, M.Sc. (IT) and under graduate courses BBA and B.Sc. Home Science.
- Improving Infrastructure: To meet the new challenges and requirement of the future, the college plans to improve infrastructure in term of building, library and physical amenities for students.
- Increasing strength of students: The higher number of students will reduce the cost of education. So the college aims at increasing the number of enrolments.

• Adding welfare schemes for students and employees.

All the budget estimates are presented in the meetings of the college Governing Body. They are discussed at length and thereafter get approved. The institution makes its plans in accordance with the UGC five year plans. The following table presents the requirements approved by the college planning Board for the XII five year plan which was submitted to the UGC, New Delhi for financial help:-

Various committees have been framed for the proper realization of perspective plans. Teachers are always actively involved in the working of institutional plans.

# 6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

The following pictorial graph gives a view of the internal organizational structure and decision making process:-



Collective decision making coupled with individual responsibility is the structural basis of the institution. A.S.High School Khanna Trust and Management Society, Khanna is the ultimate decision making authority. The Governing Body of A.S.College for Women, Khanna is the elected executive body, which has the scrutinizing power over the institution in collaboration with the above stated ultimate decision making authority. As presented in the above pictorial graph, there is an integrated organizational structure working in the institution. Dean Academics, Dean Co-Academics and Dean Sports are in alliance with the Principal. Various committees have been formed as helping hand to the Principal for the smooth functioning of the institutional activities. There is a constant dual flow of information between the Accounts office, Administrative office and the Principal Office. IQAC is another important component functioning in regular intimacy with Head of the institution. The college library is answerable to the Principal for providing library facilities to the students. Students clubs and societies are headed by the experienced senior teachers. They are required to report to the Principal frequently. The Principal has a multiaspected role to perform as there is both upward and downward communication going on within the institution, between the institution and the management constantly.

### **Teaching and Learning**

Our major concern is student-centric teaching learning process. So the betterment of the teaching methodology has always been given preeminence.

- Teachers are encouraged to mix the traditional teaching method with different padegogies like surprise tests, group discussion, debates, tutorials and seminars etc.
- The college owns accomplished faculty members, who actively remain associated with the academic programmes.
- Teachers are encouraged to under take research work.
- Schedule of Work is prepared for the balanced completion of the Syllabus through out the session.
- Meritorious students are given awards, prizes, scholarships and financial aid.
- Regular upgradation of Library
- The students become aware of the evaluation methods in their class rooms through communication with the teachers. Further the college notice board also displays evaluation information.
- The teachers are provided with full autonomy regarding their choice of seminars, refresher courses, orientation courses to enhance their knowledge.
- Special classes and remedial classes are conducted in the college.

#### **Research & Development**

The faculty is very much aware of the growing importance of the research based education. The college encourages the teachers for research work. The college is already having 12 Ph.D teachers. Many teachers of the college are engaged in active research work.

- Due encouragement is provided to the teachers for attending seminars/conferences/workshops.
- They are motivated to take initiatives for the research projects.
- For the advancement and betterment of the staff and the students seminars/conferences workshops are organized by the college.
- Important and valuable guest lectures are delievered by the eminent and well known personalities for the advantage of the staff as well as the students
- The institution also provides support in terms of laboratories, Computer, Internet, INFLIBNET, photography equipment, library and

#### Xerox facility.

#### **Community engagement**

Many cells are actively engaged in community service as the college is well aware of its social accountability and commitment.

- N.C.C. and N.S.S. Units of the college works for the good fortune of the deprived children and women, through its various social initiatives. .
- The Red Cross & Red Ribbon Society is active in the area of holding

- blood donation camps.
- Invitation to the eminent personalities of the region during cultural programmes.
- Arrangement of the guest lectures by the renowned doctors and medical practitioners for the medical awareness of the staff and students including Eye Checkup Camp, Lecture on Cancer Awareness, Hazards of over use of Mobile Phones, Importance of Breast Feeding etc.
- Keeping in mind the social responsibility the college allows the use of its auditorium and hall for social activities and govt. affairs.
- Organizing seminars on social issues.
- The passouts in the surrounding towns and villages are counselled by the college team during the admission promotion.

### **Human resource management**

The institute works with the idea of doing full justice with the deserving candidates and providing them the opportunities for further learning. The faculty and administrative staff members are motivated for the upgradation of their skills that will go long way in the improvement of the institution.

- For the decision regarding the increments and career advancement, self-apprails, API Performa's and ACR's are used.
- The prescribed norms and procedures are strictly followed while making regular appointment. The selection of contractual/Adhoc staff is also coupled with the advice of the external experts.
- There is a distribution of duties and work load among teaching staff and various committees. Conveners and the Head of the institutions work as the supervising power.
- The office superintendent and the Principal also monitor the performance of duties by the office, which have been assigned to them.
- In order to provide quality education, deserving and competent teachers on contractual/Adhoc basis are reappointed.
- The attendance record of the arrival and departure of the teachers is maintained in a register.
- Career guidance and counseling cell of the college motivates the students.
  Experts from the industry are invited to the visit the institution to provide
  career guidance and counseling to them. Industrial visit are organized for
  the students. Students of B.Sc fashion Designing and Functional English
  are provided face to face interaction with the reputed business houses and
  printing press.
- Specific duties have been assigned to class IV employees. Their performance is monitored by the office superintendent, senior teachers and the Principal.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contact etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The intercommunication between the Management and the Principal is an ongoing process. The feedback is collected from teachers, students and the public regarding the teaching quality, curriculum, co-curricular activities and so on. The important matters are conversed in the meeting of the managing committee and after thorough discussion, the activities of the institution are channelized. The press and media acts as a sharing link between the institution and the general public.

- The college Management provides an overview of all the activities carried out through the whole academic session, in the form of the publication of Annual Report.
- The College Website is an information window for the students, staff and parents. Prospectus is also a key to the information about the institution.
- Required Bodies and Panjab University are also informed regularly about the college status.
- The valuable feedback from the students, alumni and parents is discussed in the staff meetings and this is further conveyed to the management by the principal.

# 6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

The management encourages and supports involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes in the following ways:-

- Two staff members act as staff representatives in the College Governing Body.
- The Principal is privileged with full autonomy for the betterment and welfare of the institution. The involvement of various staff members including teaching and non-teaching in various committees of the college is such an initiative taken by the Principal. Every year at the start of session, a proper plan is framed to form various committees like Admission Committee, Examination Committee, Library Committee, Advisory committee, IQAC etc (Detail of various Committees given as Annexure A4 (i) to A4 (v)).
- In order to improve the effectiveness and efficiency of the staff, timely increments/career advancement/step ups are provided.
- Uniform is provided to the class IV employees annually.
- Strict norms are followed for the provision of retrial benefits like PF, Leave encashment and Gratuity.
- ESI facility/Medical allowance is provided to the staff following the desired norms.
- On the basis of the performance appraisal, contractual/adhoc staff is reappointed.

- National seminars, workshops, extension lectures and conferences are of great help to the teachers and they are given duty leave to attend such programmes.
- The Research promotion cell encourages the staff to pursue higher studies and upgrade their educational qualifications like M.Phil, Ph.D and Post Doctoral work.
- INFLIBNET, Internet and Computer with Printer facility is available in the College Library.

# 6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

A very friendly and congenial environment is provided to the faculty members for the effective working. Every individual is motivated to give out his/her the best

- All the faculty members are given instruction/guidelines regarding the institutional procedures i.e. examination, co-curricular activities, evaluation etc. to upgrade their skills.
- The faculty members are geared up so that they attend the training and skill development programmes conducted by Govt. or University.
- The staff members are inspired to make a run at the research projects.
- Various State and National level seminars are organized throwing a flood of light on the elevation of various teaching fields.
- Library and Xerox facilities are unfolded for the faculty members.
- Two staff members act as faculty representative in the Management committee. Proper implementation UGC grant is supervised by the purchase Committee and Building Committee.
- Many awareness programmers' like Health Issues, Cancer Awareness, Human Rights and use of mobile phones are conducted in the college for the benefit of staff.
- Duty leave is given to the staff to attend seminars/workshops/conferences.
- Irrespective of their years of teaching experience, permission is granted for them to pursue their Ph.D as part time researchers. Service rules are employee friendly.

# 6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The college uses self appraisal methods, self assessment proformas, prepared as per the guidelines of UGC. They are filled by each and every member of the faculty at the end of the session and the Head of the Institution

validates it and uses it to write their ACR. This exercise makes every individual alert and motivates to upgrade teaching and research.

The results of the students in the University examination, feed back from the students, passouts and parents are some of the measures of the evaluation. The Office Superintendent, in consultation with the Principal assigns the duties to class IV employees, observes the quality of services provided by them and seeks the improvement, if needed. For the valuable decision making in the area of appointment, promotion and career advancement of teachers the institution strictly follows the UGC recommended regulations regarding API based on the performance based appraisal system.

# 6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

- Performance appraisal report submitted by staff and validated by the Principal serves as basis for the upgradation of pay scales to the staff. The decision of temporary/contractual staff is also taken on such above stated report.
- The performance appraisal of the staff includes the involvement of the Management also. The working decorum of the staff members are closely scrutinized by the Management members. Annual increments and placement in the grades are realized only when they are up thumbed up by the Managing Committee. After the appraisal of the faculty, the benefits are extended at the quickest.
- The academic result of the institution is discussed in the meetings conducted by the Management and for the performance appraisal important guidelines are provided to the staff for the betterment of the institution.
- The staff members are applauded in the staff meetings for their specific achievements.
- The commendable achievements of teaching and non teaching staff members are acknowledged in the annual report of college read out at annual Prize Distribution and Convocation.
- The accomplishment of students and staff are recorded in the college Magazine 'Avastha'.

# 6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

- Employee's satisfaction makes the working atmosphere creative one. In addition to the handsome salary, various incentives measures have been taken up by Management for teaching and non-teaching staff
- There is a provision of the contributory Provident Fund Scheme.
- On the very day of retirement, the Gratuity and Earned Leaves chequesare provided to the staff member.
- There is a provision for the Maternity Leave for both aided and un-aided staff.
- Medical Leave is provided for the benefit of both aided and unaided staff.

- The staff members who go for attending seminars, workshops are provided duty leave.
- A relaxation in fees is provided to the children of employees. Class IV employees are given financial assistance for the education of their wards.
- Medicines for minor ailments are available in the institution.
- The institution organizes health awareness programmes. Expert talks by doctors and gynecologists (the college being a women's college) are organized to make the staff members aware of various health problems.
- Uniform is given to the Class IV employees. The brief detail of some of the welfare scheme availed by the employees is given in the following Table.

# 6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

Desirable working conditions and academic atmosphere are the backbone of the institution. A very congenial atmosphere is maintained in the college for the satisfaction of the staff members. There is continuation of the contractual staff in the next session. Adhoc/contractual staff is placed initially on Short term Contract for 2 years and later on they are placed on Long Term Contract for 3-5 years, depending on their performance in academic and coacademic activities of the College. Faculty members are paid a promising salary keeping in consideration their experience and qualification. Increments are provided on the basis of feedback and appraisal. Retrial benefits are executed recurrently. Teacher's quality is central to the students learning experience and the outcome of the institutional activities. In order to maintain the transparency and adopting an impartial attitude, recruitments are done on the basis of the norms and procedures, designed by the UGC, the Panjab University and the State Govt. The selection of teachers is done on, the merit basis, open advertisement and interview. Interview is conducted by well organized Selection Committees.

# **6.4** Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

# 6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The financial resources are mobilized in efficacious and reliable manner. The institution adopts a proper mechanism for the channelization of financial resources. The annual budget is passed by the governing body. The accounts are frequently monitored by the fully computerized system. All transactions are made through vouchers and collections are accumulated in the Bank. However all the disbursement is done through cheques and bank transfers. Only authorised persons are liable to operate the Bank operations. The institution is liberal, yet follows the strategy of restraint as for as the expenditure is concerned. The Institution has formed a purchase committee and proper procedure for purchases is adopted. Quotations are called for and the prices are compared. All the bills, even for minor purchases are verified by the convener of the purchase committee before submission to the accounts department. All the Grants obtained from different funding agencies is channelized only after getting approval from top management. The auditing of the college accounts is done by the qualified Chartered accountant.

# 6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

There is a frequent audit of the accounts of the institution. Bills, vouchers case menses and books are scrutinized by the bursar regularly. The Internal Auditing of the institution accounts is done by the qualified chartered accountant appointed by the A.S.High School Khanna Trust and Management society before 31<sup>st</sup> march annually.

In addition to it, Accountant General Punjab also conducts the audit of Government Grants. The audited report is placed before the Management in the meeting and the qualified remarks given by the auditor is also put before the Management to take decisions.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four year and the reserve fund/corpus available with institution, if any.

# **6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)**

- **6.5.1** Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

- (a) Yes, the institution has established Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) to adopt the accreditation quality sustenance measure which came into existence on 01-08-2005. Learning is a continuous process, the IQAC opts for the plans and programs that aim at the enrichment of the quality assurance of the college.

The IQAC is concerned about the issues including the matters as follows:-

- To bring forth new subjects and courses.
- Giving proposal for new posts as per the work-load.
- Proposal for organizing seminars, workshops, extension lectures and encouraging the staff for undertaking research work.
- Building/developing collaborations with industry, village panchayats and NGOs.
- Strengthening students with cultural and value oriented education.
- Opting for innovative teaching and learning process in addition to traditional teaching methods.
- Infrastructural improvements in accordance with the introduction of new courses and increasing strength of the institution.
- Computerization of Administrative Office.
- Regular Technological upgradation of Computer Labs in form of new softwares and introducing more Broadband Connections.
- Industrial visits in order to endorse the vocational training.
- Inculcating a sense of social responsibility.
- Scholarships for the meritorious and deserving students.
- (b) The ultimate decision making power lies in the hands of the Management. The proposals of IQAC are put into effect only when they are thumbed up by the Management. Some of the IQAC decisions which are acclaimed by the Management are as follows:-
  - 02 P.G. Courses, 01 U.G Course, 02 Certificate Courses, 02 Diploma Courses were introduced under the guidance of IQAC as mentioned in criterion 1.4.3.
  - New furniture for classrooms has been purchased.


- New flooring tiles on stage of Auditorium were fixed.
- A Multipurpose Hall and a stadium was constructed in College Sports Hall in 2011-12.
- A Medical Room was constructed in 2011-12.
- During last 5 years 4645 books and 119 Reference Books were added in the College Library. 75 Journals were renewed.
- INFLIBNET facility was added in the Library in 2013-14 which provides access to more than 6000+ e journals and 97000+ e-books.
- During last five years extra classes for weak students and special coaching for meritorious students has been conducting.
- The construction of hostel building was completed in 2010-11.
- Beautification of College Campus is a continuous process, being conducted by IQAC.
- 02 Water Coolers and 01 R.O system have been installed.
- Post Graduate Department of Mathematics organized a 3 Days' National Conference on the topic 'Recent Trends in Algebra and Analysis'.
- It was the result of untiring efforts of the IQAC that the institution received grants for setting up Swami Vivekanand Studies Centre and Dr. B.R. Ambedkar studies Centre in session 2013-14.
- (c) The IQAC of the institution has one external member Prof. (Dr.) A.C Vaid, (Pro-Vice Chancellor, Apeejay STYA University, Gurgaon). Dr. Vaid has been a guiding force to IQAC for introducing new courses at UG and PG level along with the furnishing of teaching learning process. The efficient working of administrative machinery of the college, formation of policies and the monitoring of implementation of policies has also been done under the guidance of Dr. Vaid. Former Principal Mrs. Amar Joshi, has also been actively involved in the upliftment of the College as another member of IQAC. Her valuable suggestions based on life long experience have been instrumental in bringing forth the quality assurance measures.
- (d) There is a mass participation of the Students and Alumni in the effective functioning of IQAC. They are given due consideration while carrying out institutional activities. Add on courses, being run by the college, extension lectures on Health Awareness, Informatory Lecture on burning social issues like Female Foeticide, Lectures on Career Guidance, are some of the efforts made by college keeping in view the valuable suggestions and feedback of students and alumni.
- (e) The IQAC consists of Dean Academics, Dean Co-Academics and members from both teaching and non teaching faculty. The IQAC meetings are conducted six to eight times during the Academic session for the planning and execution of quality enhancing measures to be taken. The approved decisions of meetings are further conveyed to the staff through Heads of the Departments. (Details of IQAC Composition will be presented on the on-site visit of the NAAC Peer Team.)

# 6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes' give details on its operationalisation.

Yes, the institution has an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities. The college has adopted an inbuilt quality check system to monitor day to day functioning of the institution. Various units comprising academic, sports cultural and administrative etc. have been established for the quality assurance. Special classes, remedial classes have been designed to improve the Quality education. Various committees help in maintaining the academic instruction and evaluation. Various committees have been designed for the quality assurance. The proposals of the alumni, parents and the students for the betterment of the institution are welcomed and implemented as well.

Daily attendance records of the classes are maintained by the teacher. Teachers are directed to reach the college 15 minutes before his first class of the day. The parents are acknowledged about their wards mid-term progress. Fairness and transparency in the evaluation system is maintained by table marking and showing the scripts to the students, and getting question papers printed form outside ensures secrecy.

All the members of Non-Teaching staff have been assigned duties, which are evaluated by the Superintendent and Principal. The ACR's of the concerned employees also project the assessment of their performance. The duties carried out by the Non-Teaching staff is first scrutinized by the Superintendent and then it is put before the Principal. The following pictorial graph presents the operationalization of integrated framework:-



Adopting an integrated approach, a number of departmental, curricular and cocurricular activities, are carried out collectively during each academic session (Details of Co-Academic Calender given in Annexure A13(i) to A13(v))

6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If 'yes' give details enumerating its impact.

For the upliftment of the academic and administrative working of the college, training is provided to the teaching and the non-teaching staff.

- The faculty members are cheered, aided and emboldened to attend the refresher courses, orientation programmes and UGC development programmers. Workshops and short term courses for upgrading the teaching skills.
- Joining the IT Revolution, a UGC Resource centre with internet connection and computers has been set up in the college.
- Every department is armed with necessary infrastructure to achieve its targets.
- As the process of learning is never ending, so the college assures that all the staff members are familiar with the latest methods of teaching for quality assurance.

6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes; how are the outcomes used to improve the instructional activities?

A complete and detailed analysis of the house test and university exams is done for the academic audit every year. Better strategies are adopted in order to make improvement in the existing academic structure.

The institution also does its audit in terms of general inspections at the time of introduction of new courses. The inspection committee checks the infrastructure available, the library books, journal, the number of faculty in the department concerned and the success scope of the course. Teachers wise results statements are prepared by the examination branch of the institution. The inputs regarding different academic activities undertaken during the session are collected for different departments/committees. After critical analysis of the same, the Principal of the institution emphasises the need to take on necessary corrective steps and remedial measures for improvement of the institutional activities.

- The audit definitely improves quality of institutional programmes
- New additions are made in the infrastructure and every departmentkeeps on adding equipment, books, journals, software for the benefit of the students.
- Appropriate quality Assurance measures are strictly observed by making new recruitments, granting career advancement and increments, introducing/courses, enrolling students indifferent courses, implementing scholarships and other schemes, purchasing new equipments, books and other gadgets, organizing different seminars and conferences.

# 6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

The Chandigarh Administration and Panjab University, Chandigarh, UGC/DPI and Punjab Govt. act as an external quality assurance agency/regulatory authority. Following steps have been taken for the alignment of the Internal Quality Assurance with the requirement of the external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities:-

- The college endures with the University rules, UGC guidelines and DPI instructions.
- University Rules/norms are strictly followed regarding the conduct of examinations and evaluation of results.
- Panjab University (P.U.) Schedule is followed for Practical examinations.
- P.U. Calendar is strictly followed for the work out of academic programme.

# 6.5.6 What institution mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

The teaching learning process is scrutinized under the following mechanism adopted by the institution.

# **Staff Meetings:**

A general staff meeting is conducted to provide an eye view of the important national and international days, celebration of festivals, departmental activities, seminars and activities of various clubs and societies of the College.

# Weighing up of students performance:-

Two house tests and special tests are conducted during the academic session. Assignments are given to the students and they are asked to prepare projects and PPTs'. On the basis of this performance, the students are assessed during the year and internal assessments for each subject are sent to the university.

# **Endorsement of modern teaching methods:**

Technology has flourished pedagogy and student-teacher interaction. The staff patronizes modern teaching methods by making use of smart classrooms and PowerPoint presentations for delivering lectures.

# **Feedback from students:**

The student's council conveys the problems of the students to the Principal so that proper measures for student's welfare can be taken in time. Suggestion box is also used to receive student feedback. In view of the feedback from students, newer additions of infrastructural requirements such as blackboards, books, equipments and ICT Aids are made as per need.

# Feedback from Parents and Alumni:-

The college holds Parents-Teacher-Principal Meetings in the months of November and January to inform the parents of their wards performance. Letters are sent through post to the parents of the weak students to apprise them of their ward's performance in the house examinations. Suggestions are welcomed from parents for any improvement.

Feedback is received from the Alumni to share their views on improving

the college infrastructure and methods of teaching.

# Recapitulation of Results:-

The examination committee timely conducts two House Exams strictly according to the guidelines provided by P.U. Quick evaluation of the answer sheets is done to communicate the result to the students in time.

There is a provision of remedial classes to improve their performance.

6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

A certain transparency is brought in the communication of quality assurance policies mechanisms and outcomes. Students are informed about the institutional quality Assurance guidelines through the discipline wise student assemblies and meetings of the student's welfare council held in the beginning of the session. Orientation meetings are conducted so that the newcomers should become aware about the quality assurance mechanism of the institution. Staff meetings, meetings of the managements, presentations of the annual report by the Head of the institution, prospectus, college magazine, college website, press releases advertisements in the leading news papers, educational visits of the students to other institutions, visits of other educational units during functions etc. are the measures that are adopted to communicate the policies to the internal and external stakeholders.

# 7.1 Environment Consciousness

# 7.1.1 Does the institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

The institution is very sensitive to the environment conservation and sincere efforts are made to maintain a green environment in the campus. The institution does not conduct a formal Green Audit of its campus, however, there is a Campus beautification committee specially framed to maintain the lawns, landscaping and plantation in the campus. The National Service Scheme (NSS) and National Cadet Corps (NCC) units provide their valuable inputs by adoptingeco-friendly practices like tree-plantation on Van-Mahotsva. Students are motivated to maintain a litter free campus. Leakages and overflows of water tanks are identified and appropriate measures have been taken to prevent wastage of water. Buzzar bell is used to check tank overflows. The use of harsh pesticides and herbicides in the college grounds is avoided. The various institutional facilities such as air conditioners, photocopiers, water purifiers, refrigerators, water colleges, submersible pumps, and lab equipments are regularly examined in term of electronic power consumption, gas consumption and their impact on environmental health.

# 7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus ecofriendly?

**Ecofriendly initiative:-**College's Co-Academic Calendar is framed with several ecofriendly activities which are mentioned in Criterion 5.

# **Energy Conservation**

- CFLs are used to save energy and to reduce Carbon Dioxide emissions.
   Students are encouraged to switch off the electric appliances when not in use.
- AC's are attached with power saving regulators and thermostats in order to control the consumption of electricity.
- The students are acquainted with energy conservation concepts through classroom and Morning Assembly lectures.
- The building is constructed in an eco-friendly manner with spacious rooms, ventilators and large windows to ensure free flow of fresh air, maximum natural light and minimum use of artificial light.
- Energy saving fluorescent tubes are used instead of incandescent bulbs.
- In non-reading and non-working areas, reduced lighting (25 watts-40 watts) is used.
- Computers, printers, photocopiers etc. are closed down when not in use and disconnected at the end of the day.
- Electric equipments and gadgets are shut off during non-working hours.
- Doors of all air conditioned rooms are having door closers to avoid wastage of electricity.

- Fitting is done in such a way that ACs are switched off automatically in case of electricity cut.
- Cloppy generator of Kirloskar company is installed to avoid noise pollution and air pollution.

**Use of Renewable Energy:-** The Institution is working to build up infrastructure for the use of Renewable energy

**Water Harvesting:** The spacious lawns serve as natural rain harvesting systems. In the playground, rain water percolates through the soil.

**Check Dam construction:-**The Institution has proper and well built sewerage system for the Disposal of Rain Water.

**Hazardous waste Management:-**The paper waste of Examination Branch, General office, Library and other Departments is sold for recycling of the same. Old damaged furniture items are repaired for reuse of manufacturing of other items of furniture.

# **E-waste management:**

- Instead of dumping the e-waste matrial, the college makes it sure that the E-components are properly stored.
- Various Departmental activities are organized on the topic of e-waste management.
- After their life time e-waste are sold as scrap to the local vendor. **Effects for Carbon Neutrality**

Following initiatives have been taken for carbon neutrality:

- Students are made to use electricity in conservative way so that the motto of "save electricity" can be imbibed in them.
- We engross the habit of tree plantation among the students and motive them to save the greenery.
- Many a times, notices for circulation among the staff are accepted handwritten so as to save cartridges and carbon usage.
- Every effort is made to save paper and stationery.
- Colored printing in most of the cases is avoided.
- General office, Account office, Library are fully computerized.
- The institute has installed three generator sets of 125 KVA, 63 kVA and 25 KVA, which are serviced regularly.

# **Plantation:**

- The institute has 3 lush green lawns having about 200 ornamental and shady plants.
- A committee has been formed which maintains lawns and landscaping works constantly to keep the surroundings green and aesthetically attractive.
- Tree plantation program is organized by the NSS and NCC units of the college (detail already given in 5.3.1) to sequester CO2 in the atmosphere.

# **Cleanliness:**

• There is a properly framed committee for ensuring cleanliness of the campus. All the concerned members are committed to ensure proper cleanliness in the campus.

### 7.2 Innovations

# 7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

Innovative methods are adopted by the institution keeping pace with the changing times. It keeps introducing new mechanisms for the improvement of its functioning.

# **Use of ICT:**

- Toimprove the teaching learning process and to update the knowledge, Computer with internet facility is provided with 9 (BSNL) Broadband Connections.
- Customized software's have been developed and are being used for the efficient functioning of General office and Accounts offices. These softwares have made it easy for the offices to maintain their records.
- Power point presentations are a regular feature for Post graduate classes and also for under graduate class students like B.Com and BCA students.
- College has INFLIBNET facility in the Library to explore the e-journals.
- The college has its own website with the address : <a href="www.ascwkhanna.com">www.ascwkhanna.com</a> **Special Cells:**
- Special cells like Career guidance and counseling cell, Grievance Redressal and Gender Sensitization committee against sexual harassment have been formed for the welfare of the students. The career-counseling cell of the college provides valuable information to the students regarding lucrative careers and future studies.
- New clubs, like the Red-ribbon club have been initiated in order to increase awareness about AIDS.

# **Academic Innovations:**

- Remedial classes are arranged in the college for the students who are weak in the subject of English, Economics and Mathematics.
- Coaching is also provided to S.C/S.T, B.C students without any payment of fee.
- Special classes are held in autumn break and winter break for those students who fall shortage of lectures as per university rules.
- Admission promotion workshops through power point presentation have been successfully introduced to encourage students from nearby schools to choose our college for pursuing higher education.

# **Faculty Development Programme:**

- A Short term course for the faculty members is organized by the Computer department of the college to equip them with Computer and Internet Techniques. The faculty members are given training in the use of LCD Interactive Projector.
- Along with adopting innovative teaching pedagogies, the faculty members
  are also encouraged to attend seminars/conferences/ workshops/training
  programs and other faculty programs organized by the University and
  other institutions. During the last four years, many teachers have attended
  international and national conferences/seminars/workshops etc.

• The Institution too organizes expert/extension lectures to enrich the faculty. The Department of Mathematics organized National Conference in October 2013. During the last four years, 30 such lectures were organized.

# **Student welfare Programmes:**

- Two day Personality Development workshop is organized annually for the last two sessions, which involve about 100 students.
- Students belonging to weaker sections of the society are provided with feeconcessions and free books from the library Book-bank.
- Day/Night NSS camps have been introduced for the last three sessions. The students actively take part in socially useful events in these camps.

# **Security System:**

- 26 CCTV cameras, covering the entire college campus, hostel and sports ground has been installed for centralized surveillance and better functioning.
- Gate keeper is on duty at the gate for 24X7 hours.

### **Income Generation:**

• Funds are generated by selling scrap and old newspapers etc. at the end of the year.

### 7.3 Best Practices

## **Title of the Practice**

Meticulously Planned Curriculum for Complete Personality Development (Maintaining a Balance between Curricular and Co-curricular Aspects) – ACSET Approach

Goal:,The institution aims at twin goals of enrichment of Curriculum thereby providing skill-based job-oriented courses in this globalised era to make the girl students economically independent and also at holistic development of the students to make them socially responsible citizens.

Context: The College, affiliated to Panjab University, Chandigarh adopts fivefold approach including academic enrichment, co-academic activities, sports, extension services and trips and tours to important historical places.



The institution offers education in 04 Undergraduate Courses, 05 Post graduate Courses and two Add On Courses, Besides this, at present the college is running 06 Crash Courses. Every year students of the college participate in these activities with a lot of zeal and bagged a number of prizes.

Alongwith curricular activities, Co-curricular, cultural and sports activities are meticulously planned to enhance the effectiveness of formal curriculum, impart additional skill, inculcate moral and civil values and sensitize the youth towards social and environmental issues. Students participate in Inter College sports competitions held at Panjab University, Chandigarh. The college organizes annual sports meet in which the promising sports students of the college are honoured. Extension services are being provided in the form of NCC and NSS.

The Practice: The Academic schedule is a well planned mix bag of cocurricular and cultural activities. Special emphasis is placed on adopting student-centric teaching pedagogy. Unitization of the syllabus has to be strictly followed by the teaching staff. Methods like assignments, audio-visual aids, question-answer sessions, class tests, snap tests, case studies, net surfing, workshops are incorporated in teaching-learning process, as these all are based on the mass participation of the students. Weekly/monthly tests are held in the classes as a matter of routine. Well equipped 3 Computer labs, enriched library with INFLIBNET facility, Book Bank facility, Library Reader's Club facility add to the enriched teaching learning process Alongwith curricular, Coacademic activities are also gaining big heights. NCC and NSS units have initiated a number of programmes such as literacy drive, lecture on Health, Hygiene, Yoga awareness, career guidance, Eye check up Camp, Tree Plantation, Traffic Rules awareness, Blood Donation Camp. Beside this NSS department along with Social Sciences Department celebrate Independence Day, Republic Day and Sadhbavana Divas in the college. NSS units of the college arrange Day and Night camps in the college. The students are motivated at the beginning of every academic year to enroll themselves for NCC. Students attend various Annual Training Camps and also the camps for the training of Republic Day Parade going to be held at Republic Day at New Delhi. NCC Cadets also participate in March Past and National Anthem on Independence Day and Republic Day which is celebrated by Sub-Division Khanna. In the last four years and till date, 62 trips were organized.

Evidence of Success: The College has made giant strides in academic, curricular, co-curricular and cultural activities. During the last 4 years, various faculty members and as many as 1781 students of the college got benefitted from the Library Reader's Club facility and Book Bank facility. University Examinations during the post accreditation period. Under the expert guidance of the Management and the Principal and co-ordinated efforts of the teachers, the excellent annual results of the last four sessions in University Examinations, kept aloft the glorious tradition as the general pass percentage of M.A. (Hindi) M.A. (Eco), M.A. (Soc), M.Sc. (Maths), B.Com III, B.C.A. III, B.Com. III Hons.B.C.A III Hons.and B.AIII Hons.was 100% that of B.AII and B.A III was more than 95% and pass percentage of the college was much higher than University pass percentage. 

vision committee is constituted to workout for the introduction of new add-on. vocational and innovation course in the college. In the year 2013-14,two Add-on courses i.e.Communcative English Computer Based Accounting were introduced.



#### SECTION - I

#### Introduction

Keeping in view the objective of providing exclusive higher education facilities to the girls in the rural and semi-urban area around Khanna town, A.S. High School Trust and Management Society, Khanna upgraded the Girls' Wing in the local A.S.College, in July 1973 into a full fledged Undergraduate Arts College for Women, on Amloh Raod, close to the local bus stand. Making a humble beginning with an enrolment of 473 students, now it has 1182 students on its rolls in the faculties of Arts and Commerce. The College has an impressive building which has the Principal's office, twenty class rooms, library, Home Science laboratories, Fashion Designing, Fine Arts and Music Work rooms, auditorium, mini hall, six departmental staff rooms, common room, gymnasium, administrative office, audio-visual room and lawns - all spread over a total campus area of 4.54 acres. The college has seventeen teaching departments. It also offers three vocational courses besides B.C.A, PGDCA, M.A (Hindi) and M.A (Economics). The college has forty five teachers including the Principal out of whom only twelve are regular while others are either ad hoc appointees or are part time teachers.

It is affiliated to Panjab University, Chandigarh and it follows annual system in its admissions, teaching and examination schedule as per its guidelines and norms. The college stands included in the list of colleges maintained by the UGC under sections 2(f) and under Section 12 B of its Act of 1956.

The college prepared its Self-Study Report in December, 2003 and volunteered to be assessed by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), Bangalore, which constituted a Peer Team comprising Prof. B.P. Bhatnagar, former Vice Chančellor, Rajasthan Vidyapeeth University, as Chairman, Dr.(Mrs) Shyama Sharma, former Principal, Vaish Mahila Mahavidyalaya, Rohtak as Member and Prof K.K. Bajaj, former Dean of Colleges—cum-Director, College Development Council, Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla, as Member Coordinator, to visit the college and validate the Self-Study Report.

Before visiting the college, Prof Bhatnagar, Chairman of the Peer Team, held an in-house meeting at the place of stay of the members, at 7.30 PM on 4th<sup>h</sup> November, 2004 at Khanna to discuss and exchange notes on the Self-Study Report submitted by the college vis-à-vis evaluation framework and formulate procedure and modalities to be followed for its validation during the visit to the college

The team visited the college on 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> November, 2004 and was given a detailed presentation on its academic, co-curricular highlights and other activities by the Principal. After interacting with her, the members of the team went round the campus of the college and visited all the departments and discussed various academic inputs and amenities available with the concerned teachers. The members of the Team also visited the class rooms, Home Science and Fashion Designing laboratories, Fine Arts work place, Music class room, library and computer center set up to cater to the needs of BCA and PGDCA students. The NAAC Team also went round the campus and sought information on teaching, student support services and other infrastructural facilities. After interacting with the Principal, teachers, students, non-teaching staff, parents and old students of the college and after verifying the relevant documents and records referred to in the Self-Study Report, the Peer Team submits the following report, based on seven criteria laid down by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council.

#### SECTION 2

#### CRITERION-WISE ANALYSIS

#### Criterion - 1: Curricular aspects

As a college affiliated to Panjab University, subjects and combinations being followed are those which have been approved by the University and for which the college has been given affiliation. In the faculty of Arts, in addition to the two compulsory subjects (English and Punjabi) students have the option to choose three more subjects out of the available seventeen elective subjects such as English, Punjabi, Hindi, Sanskrit, Economics, Political Science, Sociology, History, Mathematics, Home Science, Physical Education, Public Administration, Fine Arts, Music and vocational subjects such as Fashion Designing, Functional English and Computer Applications. In the faculty of Commerce course options, as are permissible under the university norms and as are possible in view the institutional constraints, are available to the students. Post-Graduate teaching for PGDCA and M.A. in Hindi and Economics, is also offered.

The syllabi in different subjects are as prescribed by the university and as such the teachers cannot make any changes in these. Only a few of them (only one teacher each in the subjects of English and Sanskrit) are members of Boards of Studies in some subjects and decision making bodies of the university and as such they are not completely in a position to provide any direct inputs. The Principal of the college is a member of the Academic Council of the University.

The college follows annual system in all its undergraduate courses for which the examinations are conducted by Panjab University, Chandigarh, for award of degrees to successful candidates.

The college does not refuse admission to any candidate if she fulfills the minimum required eligibility criterion of passing the qualifying examination. There is no pre-entry counseling as such. However, the Principal and the teachers give guidance to the students at the time of admission to make them confident and self-dependent in the college.

#### Criterion - II: Teaching, Learning and Evaluation

Following an open door admission policy, the college tries to bring its students from the socio-economically disadvantaged milieu to the academic mainstream and attempts to develop closer student-teacher interaction and communication. The inputs include their motivation and monitoring in the classrooms to help them overcome their deficiencies. There is no formal system for the identification and coaching of advanced or backward learners. However, the teachers offer due guidance and devote time to the needs of the deserving students who are otherwise weak in studies through remedial coaching. Class tests are also held for this purpose. The college has stated that it held classes for 203 teaching days in 2002-2003 including admission and examination days. But it is seen from the scrutiny of the attendance registers that the overall attendance of the students in classes has been for about one hundred and eighty days. Teaching is done generally in the conventional manner yet in some of the departments use of OHPs and other audio-visual aids is there besides the display of charts and models in practical classes. Quiz programs and class discussion also contribute to the quality of teaching.

There are only thirteen permanent teachers including the Principal besides thirty other ad hoc appointees and two part-time teachers. The college has a support staff of twelve persons in the office. Being a grant-in-aid college regular recruitment and appointment to teaching positions is done under a procedure laid down by the Panjab University/DPI (Colleges) Punjab and as per qualifications laid down by the UGC and through the properly constituted selection committees consisting of members of the Management, the Principal, nominees of the Vice-Chancellor and the DPI (Punjab). Anticipating the additional teaching workload, temporary appointments are also made by the college

Management and the Principal. However, to overcome shortage of qualified faculty due to procedural delays, the Principal also makes appointment of faculty for stipulated time period for guest faculty but this method is not resorted to regularly.

Elective subjects are taught in Punjabi and Hindi. Though there is no unitization of lessons yet to complete the syllabi in good time before the examinations the teachers plan their teaching inputs and schedule their delivery in a time frame of three well defined terms. House Examinations are held weekly / monthly and in September and December. The answer books are shown to the students regularly.

Teacher- learner ratio being low and manageable and percentage of classes taught by full-time faculty (including ad hoc appointees) being 94.59 % in many subjects, personal contact with the students is maintained for interaction and better learning possibilities. Teachers can attend Refresher Courses conducted by Academic Staff Colleges for their eligibility to earn selection grade. The Principal on the basis of results and other norms of conduct writes ACRs. The college has introduced the method of teachers' self-appraisal, and students' feedback and interaction with parents and old students.

Eligibility of students to take their university examinations is linked to their attendance to the extent of 75 % in each subject. To follow this norm, regular information about shortage of lectures is displayed on the notice board and the students and their parents are kept informed. The overall examination results of the college in almost every subject over the past three years have been commendable.

#### Criterion - III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

The entire focus of the college being on teaching only so as to bring the students to mainstream academic excellence there is no distinct endeavor to undertake research by the faculty even when seven of its teachers are PhDs and five others are M.Phil degree holders. The teachers cannot guide research as they are not permitted to do so under the

university rules. Four of its departments are single faculty departments apparently due to low enrolments in them. Because of institutional constraints, there is small consultancy initiative or involvement on the part of the faculty at the local level particularly in the field of computer applications.

However, there are some initiatives on the part of the faculty to involve the students in the NSS activities to undertake community services such as health and hygiene, improved sanitation, AIDS, national integration, environmental issues, blood donation, career guidance, art of living, women empowerment and gender issues etc in the slum area of Model town and other rural areas around the college. The college has one NSS unit. This functions under the guidance of a Program officer of the college to organize NSS activities. Through the voluntary help and involvement of its students the campus is kept clean and green. Women cell has also be set up.

The college has an impressive record of achievements in cultural activities particularly in the organization of the recently held Zonal Cultural Youth Festival wherein its students did remarkably well and bagged a number of prizes and in the field of sports particularly in tug of war where two of its students have been selected for participation in the even to be held in Taiwan. Karate and Table Tennis are the other events in which its students have excelled in inter-college and inter varsity levels.

#### Criterion -IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources.

The physical facilities of the college have been developed in phases. The college has an impressive building which accommodates the Principal's office, departmental staff rooms, common room, class rooms, laboratories, library, computer centre, mini hall, auditorium, administrative office, canteen, spacious grounds etc. It has facilities for indoor games such as Table-Tennis, carom and chess. It has a large playground with a well laid out 200 meter athletic track.

The college Library has 16841 books out of which 690 books were added in 2003-2004. Information on these catalogued and classified books has been computerized. The library is getting fifty five magazines and journals besides a twelve newspapers. All of them are in Punjabi, Hindi and English. The library is open on all working days from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. It follows an open access system for its students. There is a book bank available for free issue of books for the session to the deserving poor students. Books are issued to students for duration of fourteen days. The Library has a spacious reading room with an area of 140 Sq Mtrs.

The college has twenty two computers which are being used for BCA, PGDCA and other computer-related awareness and teaching programs besides being put to use for administrative, library and accounts work.

To ensure continuous power supply to the campus, the college has a new generator of 70 KVA capacity installed.

The college does not offer hostel facilities. It has water coolers and water purifies for its students. It also offers medical care through a part-time visiting doctor with a room allocated for the purpose.

#### Criterion -V: Student Support and Progression

The government and the college management have provided substantial financial support to three hundred twenty two students in the session 2003-2004 in the shape of fee concessions, merit scholarships and freeships belonging to SC/STs, OBCs and other categories. In the years 2001-2002 and 2002-2003 as many as 314 and 302 students were given these concessions. The financial aid to students under different schemes of the government and management is highly encouraging in bridging social disparities.

Since the college offers only two Post-Graduate courses in Hindi and Economics, there is limited vertical academic mobility available to its students. It does not offer any formal vocational guidance or training as such. The dropout rate is high as many students are unable to cope with the content requirement of courses along with other socio-economic compulsions. The college publishes its updated prospectus every year for the information and guidance of students. It also publishes the college magazine to give expression to the creative thinking and talent of its students. Students' feedback on institutional support and teaching has been introduced from the previous session. Its analysis is being utilized to improve the system and have midcourse corrections in the teaching learning continuum.

#### Criterion -VI: Organization and Management

The college has good internal coordination, and works through a number of committees set up every year in the process of democratic and decentralized management. This offers a fine example of participative management and sharing of responsibility from top to bottom. This is reflected in cultural and co-curricular activities which need to be further diversified and encouraged. The unit cost of education is Rs. 9973.40 (including salary) and Rs 470.47 (excluding salary). There is no formal grievance redressal cell but most of the complaints are settled by the Principal, staff and the management amicably. However the Principal of the college is an Hon'ble member of the local Lok Adalat.

There is commendable understanding and endorsement of actions relevant to the academic activities and initiatives of the college by the management of the college which meets every month to overview the interests and requirements of the college.

The college has shown a budget of Rs. 1,13,64,500/- for 2003-2004 out of which Rs. 1,06,63,000/- was to be spent on salaries. The revenue from tuition fee etc is only Rs 26,15,000/- which is very low. Obviously it does not contribute any substantial amount. The fees have not been revised during the last three years. Grant-in-aid towards payment

of salaries against covered posts and disbursement of scholarships to students is released by the state government and rest is the liability of the college management to meet from its own resources.

The college has made a commendable effort in raising additional resources through donations particularly from the local MP and the MLA, release of a souvenir, alumni association, self-financing courses, organization of a fete etc to the extent of Rs 47,97,450/- to tide over financial stringency being experienced by it.

The college was sanctioned IX Plan UGC developmental assistance to the extent of Rs 7,35,000/- out of which it received Rs 6,95,000/-. Besides this the college received Rupees three lac for the vocational course on Functional English in the IX Plan. There is also regular government audit and a chartered accountant to audit the accounts of the college.

It has received a letter from the U.G.C, in April, 2003 vide which it has been conveyed the allotment of Rs 8,32,320/- for the X Plan period. The college has since received Rs 3,74,544/-. The college has also received a grant of Rs 67,275/- for its computer centre. Additionally it has also received Rs 3,00,000/- for the introduction of a vocational course on Fashion Designing.

The staff is offered such loans as are permissible under the government norms and procedures for private college.

#### Criterion -VII: Healthy Practices

Every year the college commences its session with "Havan Yajna" and dedicates its activities to its avowed mission of promoting the cause of women education, human values and promotion of quality education. The teacher-student relations in the college are very cordial. Accessibility of the teachers to students in all subjects is a contributory

factor. Overall, a harmonious environment among various sections of the college is noticeable. The Principal, faculty, non-teaching staff and students have contributed to the neat and beautiful maintenance of the campus.

The students are given prizes for making maximum use of the library through their attendance. There is no menace of ragging and use of unfair means in the college.

In order to encourage students in all activities the college holds annually prize distribution functions. It also holds lectures by the spiritual / intellectual persons.

Home Science laboratories and class room inputs are addressing the local needs of its students. Fashion Designing course combines the contemporary and the traditional designs to blend the tastes and requirements of the rural and the urban milieu. Language Laboratory is an attempt to improve the phonetic performance and skills of the students in the Functional English course. Fine Arts studio is a commendable workplace to allow expression to the creative urge of the students besides learning the basics of Art as a subject.

The college has a composite Central Students Association consisting of twenty five members of whom thirteen are elected members while twelve other are nominated on the basis of their academic merit. This is a democratic body of students which helps the college in maintenance of discipline, organization of its activities and promotes understanding and amity among the students and the college authorities.

There is regular annual stock-checking of articles in the college and damaged articles and furniture are got repaired.

The non-teaching staff is cooperative and efficient in their work. They help the Principal in providing smooth and effective administration.

The services of the college NSS unit are utilized to create awareness among the students about the values of social service, community development and civic responsibilities. Special lectures are arranged on various topics like AIDS awareness, environmental pollution, population control etc. to make them aware of contemporary social problems and persisting social evils.

The uninterrupted power supply through 8 KVA and 76 KV generators on the campus ensures regularity of classes and laboratory work.

The college evinces keen interest in the preservation of Punjabi culture and heritage through collection of traditional articles and artifacts of Punjabi under its Punjabi department through its window called "Virsa". This also contributes significantly to the enrichment of the cultural profile of the college as well and enables its students to stay informed and attached to their cultural moorings, heritage and conventional way of life.

The college has its own website which is quite informative and useful. It has interdepartmental connectivity to stay in touch throughout.

The college has an Extension Counter of State Bank of Patiala on its campus.

#### Overall Analysis

The Peer team carefully went through the Self-Study Report and after its visit to various departments for interaction with teachers and others and after taking into account academic and other physical facilities in the college in serving the cause of quality higher education with a focus on the girl students of the area, has arrived at the following overall analysis:

The college which is now more than three decades old has an impressive infrastructure spread over an area of 4.54 acres of land, protected from encroachment by a wall. The

college setting and its location, abetting the Khanna Amloh state highway, has considerable ambience as a place for good learning. The Management displays distinct social concern and interest in the development of the college through its meaningful participation in providing resources and manpower whenever and wherever needed.

The workload of the teachers is as per norms and stipulations of the UGC and the University. But there is an alarming presence of temporary teachers in the college. It is explained in the context of non-availability of sanctioned posts and grant-in-aid from the state government. This uncertainty in profession tells upon the health of academic commitment and impairs quality.

The different departments of the college such as of Home Science, Fine Arts, Fashion Designing, Commerce, Economics and Computers could combine to offer common interdisciplinary hobby courses such as on painting, interior decoration, computer aided designs, flower arrangements, dietetic studies, health care, cooking, e-commerce, inventory management, insurance procedures, BPO, balance sheet making etc.

Besides the above, the computer facilities could be put in LAN and extended to the reach all departments, laboratories, canteen etc for all teachers and students.

#### Suggestions

The Peer Team makes the following suggestions:

• The role of the faculty by and large reflects its involvement and commitment. This continues to enthuse the serious students to excel in their studies and co-curricular activities and work hard to perform better. But majority of the teachers being ad hoc appointees, an exercise requires to be undertaken to fill up all sustainable teaching posts on regular basis so that greater accountability could be

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built into the teaching learning process. Contractual teaching may be resorted to only wherever it is absolutely of contingent nature and for coping with mid-session needs.

- There is an apparent need to expand computer literacy and related courses on a part-time basis which enhance the skills and employment potential of the students.
- The library being the hub of all academic activities of teachers and students requires to be computerized for quick reference, retrieval and issue of books. It also requires to be substantially strengthened with a significant addition of books and journals in all the subjects particularly in Music, Home Science, Fine Arts, Sanskrit, Economics and Fashion Designing. Daily display of important news through a wall magazine outside the library may be made a routine activity for the general information of the students.
- Science classes may be introduced with modern subjects such as Bio-informatics, Bio-Physics, Industrial Chemistry, Polymers, Plastics, Information technology, Ceramics, Human biology, Radio-therapy, Diathermy, Technician education etc.
   M.Com courses with a focus on market driven needs be examined to be introduced.
- Linkages with industry in and around Khanna be explored by Commerce Dept.
- With the progressive depletion of support from the Government, further
  possibilities may be explored by the college management to introduce short-time
  and part-time new courses which may generate the much needed income in
  addition to creating new avenues for the students' placements and employability.

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- UGC assistance as is admissible to a college may be sought for all projects and programs through better information and liaison. Regular availability of this grant be ensured through proper and timely utilization of grant already released and submission of utilization certificates to the UGC.
- The drop-out rate being high requires a careful analysis and follow-up action so as
  to retain the students in the college and to minimize wastage of human and
  financial resources.
- NSS unit should be more actively involved in socially relevant activities and campaigns such as on drug abuse, poverty alleviation measures, health and hygiene in rural and slum settings. Propagation of environmental awareness, human rights and duties should be the avowed theme of their involvement.
- NCC may be introduced in the college to offer an avenue to the girls for their participation in the national defense services.
- Regular follow up action on the analysis of teachers' self-appraisal may be
  undertaken along with students' views on their teachers' performance, at the end
  of each session for the benefit of the teachers and the institution and for enhancing
  commitment, quality and discipline in the college.
- Alumni association may be involved in all such activities of the college which are
  vision-linked and progressive in nature through more meetings so that those who
  go out form the college are able to lean back and contribute to the college to the
  best of their abilities and affordability after they settle down in life.
- Guidance through bridge courses in communication skills in English may be provided to instill the much-needed confidence in students who are otherwise

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deficient in this regard. Better utilization of language laboratory can also be assured through this.

- New add-on market friendly courses of regional relevance and in consonance with the emerging occupational patterns and as per market survey be examined to be introduced to augment resources.
- More discussions on such live issues as women's rights and civic responsibilities may be organized to inculcate a concern about duties and rights among the students.
- Interest in research which is an integral complement of teaching, needs to be encouraged. This alone ensures quality in teaching despite all physical and resource limitations of an institution. Research orientation may be encouraged among the teachers in the college. Teachers should undertake minor or major research projects in areas of their own interest and specialization with assistance from such funding agencies as UGC, DBT, ICHR, ICSSR, etc. There could be better research liaison between the college faculty and the university faculty in different subjects. The management may also encourage this through some monetary provision in the college budget which could enable the faculty to participate in national seminars and workshops.
- Teaching methods be made more technology enabled and student-friendly with greater help of OHPs and other affordable teaching aids.
- Computer Applications department should enrich and extend its teaching inputs to
  promote greater employability of its students. It should liaise with the department
  of Fashion Design and promote it through computer aided designs with the help
  of computers. The department should acquire latest hardware and software that

could be of use in the departments of Commerce, Fine Arts, Fashion Design and
Home Science.

- General lectures particularly on value education, human rights and ethics by
  distinguished persons from other institutions may be organized more frequently to
  provide for the much-needed exposure to the teachers and students of the college.
  More interactive seminars and academic workshops on topics of contemporary
  issues may be organized to give teachers a platform to exchange their views and
  know the latest in their respective fields.
- Interdepartmental initiatives may be undertaken to launch short term hobby courses and classes for part-time students and for additional resource mobilization.
- Despite the availability of limited land on the campus a scheme of commercial cultivation of flowers, cacti, worm-culture etc may be taken up so as to augment the resources of the college while at the same time creating hobby-interests among the students.
- Fine Arts, Home Science and Fashion Designing Departments may organize
  regular exhibitions and other activities to augment resources and to address the
  students around to enable them to know the relevance of the courses and facilities
  available in the college. This would also promote a spirit of participation and
  collegiality besides better understanding and fraternity among all.
- A vision committee may be constituted by the college to workout a perspective plan for the introduction of new add-on, vocational and innovative courses in the colleges. The committee may consist of a few local notables, representatives of alumni, teachers and the principal to work out its financial and other requirements.


